The Dancing School and the Influence It Has On the Children.

Editor of the HEADLIGHT:

Several weeks ago I saw in your paper a communication from Prof. Walker, mentioning the effect that the dancing school, now in progress, has upon the pupils of the schools. Perhaps the fact that you attend the class some might make you indisposed to insert any criticism, but if you don't want to insert this you can throw it into the waste basket. My children do not attend the dancing school, and what I know of it I get from others who do.

With dancing, itself, I have no fault to find, if it is properly conducted. Dancing is like many other things—the use is all right, it is the abuse that does the harm.

If the class in question were composed of young men and young women it would be different, but it is composed of boys and girls who go to school. Now is it proper or best for a child to go out five nights in the week and stay till eleven o'clock or half past eleven and indulge during all this time in the most violent exercise, for three or four hours? Those children do not get to sleep until midnight, and as most of them have to get up at 6 o'clock, or earlier, in the morning, is it any wonder that they are stupid and that their teachers complain? Children at the age of from 12 to 18 require from 8 to 10 hours sleep and if they do not get it, especially if they do not get it for a period of three months or more, physical injury is bound to be the result.

But this is not the worst feature of such dissipation. The children's minds are kept in a continual whirl of excitement and it is impossible for them to keep their minds on their books, or, in fact, any thing else except their heels and the companions of the opposite sex, whom they meet at the dancing class. All they think of is to go, go, go, and dance, dance, dance, night and day, and their parents and teachers must assume the responsibility of overcoming all this additional tendency towards folly in so far as that can be done.

But even this evil is surpassed by a greater one: When our girls go to dancing school they are compelled to associate with boys that we would not allow them to associate with in our homes and the result is that an intimacy develops that may lead to untold sorrow in future years. The dancing class now in progress has in it some of the nicest and best people in the town but it has also in it some boys not fit for innocent girls to associate with.

Of the teacher I know nothing and care still less. He cuts no figure in the question at all. It is simply and solely a question of the duty that parents owe to their children and whether or not they have a right to dwarf the minds and moral nature of their children to secure for them the comparatively insignificant accomplishment of dancing well.
