(FROM THE OCEAN WAVE)

Deputy Sheriff Ross, of Lincoln county chased the man who was supposed to have burglarized Gorman's store in Newport, all the way from Newport to Slab creek, in this county, but the chase was finally successful.

Deputy Sheriff Ross, in working up the Gorman case became convinced that Andrew Carlson, a fisherman who had been on the lower bay for several years, had a hand in that burglary, and started out to arrest him. About that time Carlson thought he would get out of the country and started up the beach. Deputy Ross, accompanied by Frank Priest started after him, and also kept a watch for the negro who had been around Newport and Yaquina for several days, and who also started up the beach. At Siletz bay they were right behind the man, who crossed the bay ahead of them. The officers could get no boat that night, and had to stop on the south side. The next morning, before they could get over, they saw Carlson strike out up the beach. Finding a leaky, old canoe they crossed the bay and again took up the chase. They were never close enough to their man to get their hands on him until they got to Slab creek, in this county. Here they captured him. When captured Carlson had some of the watches and revolvers that had been stolen from Gorman's store in his possession. He also had some of the provision that were supposed to have been taken from Gorman's store, and also some goods that had evidently come from Davis & Winant's saloon, that was burglarized recently.

A darkey supposed to be the one referred to above has found employment for a few days at the farm of Steve Hill about seven miles up the Nestucca river.

Last Thursday, the legal voters of this district met at the school house and voted a six mill tax; four mills to be applied on general school fund for school purposes, and two mills to be used for painting and repairing the school house and fixing up the grounds and out houses. A six mill tax will bring over one hundred dollars into the district, sixty-five dollars of which when applied on the school fund will give us a six month school.
