Hot Shot

Rev. Joseph Schell had a stirring article in a recent number of the Oregonian on "What Ails Tillamook" from which we here make a few extracts. The article deals mainly with the transportation problem which has already been so fully discussed in the Headlight but it introduces some new ideas as showing that all the loss that comes to the country through imperfect transportation facilities falls eventually upon the producer. Following is an extract from the letter.

With fertile soil, a mild and healthful climate untold wealth in her forests and fisheries, what does Tillamook lack? She lacks proper transportation facilities; she lacks honest capitalists, willing to lend their money for a reasonable return, and willing that the borrower shall still retain his self-respect and manhood; she lacks population; she lacks an independent, progressive and enlightened public spirit to push her development, to advertise her resources and to make pleasant the way for the newcomer he would be one of us.

After all, who suffers when freight rates are high, or boats irregular? Is it the merchant? Not by any means. He simply adds freight to his cost, to the cost of the goods, and if incoming goods are delayed, his customers can wait, and little does he worry, because all his competitors are in the same boat. If a consignment of butter deteriorates in value because of delay in shipment, whose loss is it? Why, the producer's? To be sure; not the Tillamook or Portland merchant's. The selfsame producer, who pays the freight on goods shipped in and shipped out, who stands the loss by irregularity and delay.

The closing sentences of the article are particularly pungent and strong.

The spirit of progress and civilization needs investigating among us; we are and must continue to be something more than lolling clams eating. We need a united energy. When one portion of the community seeks to take a forward step, let not the rest grab them by the coat tails and pull back. Let us encourage and assist one another. Let us welcome industrious strangers. Our population must increase before we shall enjoy all the benefits of civilization, so let us not frown upon the newcomers. Every man who comes and adds his mite to the general stock, benefits all. Why should a citizen of Tillamook conduct himself toward a newcomer as a dog with a bone acts toward another that would share it? The savage tribes were not permitted to carry out any such policy when the whites came and possessed the land. Shall the white savage frighten progress from our doors?
