NOTICE No. 1. Notice is hereby given that sealed proposals will be received at this office up to and including February 18th, 1898 at 4 P. M. for running, measuring, and marking, according to law and instructions, the following described surveys, to wit:

Bids must be at stated prices per mile for each and all of the above classes of surveys, and no bids will be considered where the prices exceed \$20.00 per mile for subdivisional and connecting lines, \$25.00 for township and range lines, and \$25.00 for base, standard meridian and meander lines.
