Only responsible, reliable, and competent surveyors will be employed, who must execute their surveys in person, and will be required to give bond in double the estimated amount of contract in each instance.

It will be required that the surveys herein described be completed and returned made to this office on or before Dec. 31st, 1898.

Surveyors may submit bids under more than one notice, but the bids must be separate under each, and this office will limit each deputy to such an amount of work as can be properly completed within the time specified.

The right is reserved to reject any and all bids, and no contracts will be binding on the part of the United States until approved by the Commissioner of the General Land Office.
