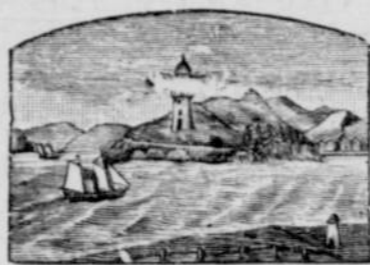

A couple of weeks ago we announced the departure of John Embum for the Klondike. The announcement was a little premature, but we understand that Mr. Embum left on the last trip of the Harrison.

The old Catholic Church was moved on Monday to the Academy grounds and now does duty as a working room, dry room and woodshed. Quite a large number of the members and friends of the church joined in the work of moving the building.

Mail carrier Luce reports the beach between False Tillamook and Elk Creek, is a worse condition than usual this winter. The sand usually washes out to some extent every winter, but the unusually heavy storms of the past few months has left nothing but rocks all along the beach and it is now difficult traveling except at a very low tide. The sands begin to drift in among the rocks again in the spring time and when summer comes there will be one long sandy stretch of beach again.—Nehalem Times.

Agent T. J. Buford, of the Siletz reservation, came up to Nehalem last Sunday and remained until Wednesday morning, engaged in enrolling the Indians who will receive pay from the government for their lands, in which work he was assisted by P. D. Newell.

The amount is the Original price, \$10,500, for the lands claimed by the Naalem band of the Tillamook tribe, and described as follows:

Beginning at the mouth of Elk creek and following the coast line south to a point of rocks south of the mouth of the Nehalem river, thence east in a straight line to the summit of the Coast range, thence north along the summit of the Coast range to the headwaters of Elk creek, thence following the waters of Elk creek west to the place of beginning.

This land was ceded to the Government in 1851, and the Indians have never received a dollar of the purchase price.

Mr. Newell informs us that so far only fifteen or sixteen have been discovered that are entitled to a share of this money, with two or three doubtful applicants whose genealogy is now being investigated; and the gentlemen went to Garibaldi for that purpose Wednesday. Agent Buford hopes to be able to return to Nehalem in March to make a distribution of the funds.—Nehalem Republican.
