The latest in railroad circles, says the Astorian, is the report put out last night on good authority that Mr. A. B. Hammond's latest scheme is the completion of the old Corey line through the Nehalem to make connection with the Southern Pacific, thus forming an outlet for Willamette Valley products direct to Astoria. In connection with this it is said that the Klickitat railroad, now partly constructed from Vancouver, Wash., will be finished to the eastern Washington grain fields in the same interest. The presence of Corey Bros., and supt Mr. Wattis, in Astoria, lends some color to the statement. Two years ago it was stated in the Astorian that Mr. Hammond's plans probably contemplated the direct connection of Flavel with the Nehalem coal fields and the Willamette Valley.

#### Town Council Meeting.

The Common Council of Tillamook City meet in regular session on the 7th, inst., and allowed the following bills: Water rent for Jan. \$40.00 Marshal sal. Jan and extra work 33.00 Recorder salary for Jan. 10.00 W. H. H. Cary for Hardware 2.50 Pacific Lumber Co. for lumber 3.25 Ordinance No. 97 on rules and order of business, Ordinance No. 98 on licensing dogs and Ordinance No. 100 on obstructing streets and sidewalks were adopted.

Steps were taken to drain the surface water from 1st street through the Goodspeed place.

Street crossing were ordered on certain streets in the Miller addition.

The resignation of Councilman C. P. Knudson was accepted, and the proposition for a sidewalk on Stillwell Ave. taken under consideration.

#### Help the Children.

Through the kindness of Geo. Cohn of the firm of Cohn & Co. we have been handed a recent circular, of the Oregon Children's Home Society. Amongst other things the circular says: "The mission of this Society is to seek homeless, neglected and abused children and procure legal control of them and find well approved Christian homes in which they may be placed, and through Local Advisory Boards keep a careful supervision over them until they become of legal age. The work is national in its character. The Children's Home Society was awarded

medal and diploma at the World's Fair. An extract from the diploma is thus worded: "This method is the most aggressively humane movement to arrest the growth of the dangerous classes. For in a short time the organization has been adopted by fourteen (now twenty-two) other States. This exhibit deserves the award for its excellent organization."

Our work commends itself to all for its natural and economic methods of saving the children. While the institutional child costs from one to two hundred dollars a year; the average cost per child to our Society in Oregon, has been only a little more than twenty-five dollars, and this includes careful supervision until of legal age. Our work on this up: coast from June, 1896 to June, 1907, has been the receiving and placing in good homes one hundred children since of the same being received from Washington and placed there, as two States were working conjointly until December last, when they were divided, and are now working under separate management.

Can you not find it in your heart to help us in this great work for the children? As we are wholly dependent upon the voluntary gifts of those who are friends of the children. You may become a member of the Society by the payment of one dollar each year, or a life member on the payment of twenty-five dollars, now or in five annual payments. By paying a patron membership of fifty dollars in a single payment or ten dollars annually for five years, you save two children; or by paying a benefactor's membership of one hundred dollars in a single payment, or twenty dollars annually for five years, you secure good homes for destitute children. "Help a child to find a home."

To whom it may concern: This is to say that it gives me pleasure to commend the Oregon Children's Home Society, of Portland, Oregon, as a charitable institution of great merit and deserving of encouragement and hearty support. The mission of the Society is to seek out homeless and neglected children and place them under conditions which shall improve their minds, cultivate their hearts and make them industrious and useful citizens. Certainly the duty of reclaiming and caring for these dependent children will find ready response in generous contributions for the support and maintenance of the institution. I understand, under the supervision of Rev. I. F. Tobey, the Society is conducting humane principles and economic methods, and I cheerfully commend him and his work to the public. WM. F. Lord.

#### Ordinance No. 100.

An Ordinance to prohibit and restrain the placing of obstruction upon the sidewalks, cross walks, streets or alleys of Tillamook City.

The people of Tillamook City do ordain, as follows: Sec. 1. No person shall place or cause to be placed in any street, alley, sidewalk, or cross walk within the limits of Tillamook City, any obstruction of any kind or nature, without having first obtained a permit from the street commissioner. Provided however, that this section shall not apply to merchandise while in actual course of receipt or delivery, and provided further, that wood for fuel, may be allowed to be piled and remain in the street or alley, in such a manner as to cause the least obstruction to public travel, not to exceed forty-eight hours for each cord thereof, and not to exceed ten

days in the aggregate without a permit from the street commissioner, which permits shall specify the number of days not to exceed five days.

Sec. 2. No person shall throw into or deposit upon any public street, alley, sidewalk or cross walk, any glass, metal, broken crockery ware, dirt, rubbish, garbage, or filth, and no person shall carry upon any sidewalk any thing exposed, that is offensive to pedestrians or to the general public.

Sec. 3. No person being the owner of or having charge of any vehicle, or any other kind of conveyance, or any beast of burden, shall intentionally cause or permit the same to stop or stand upon any street crossing or side walk, or so near thereto, as to obstruct the same.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the street commissioner to notify all persons who, having placed any obstruction upon any of the public streets, alleys, sidewalks or crosswalks within limits of Tillamook City (that is an obstruction to public travel) prior to the passage of this Ordinance to remove such obstruction, within five days. And if such person or persons, shall refuse or neglect to remove such obstruction within five days, such person or persons, shall be punished as provided in Sec. 6 of this Ordinance.

Sec. 5. In case of the refusal or neglect, of any person to remove such obstruction, as stated in sections 1, 2, 3, and 4, it shall be the duty of the City Marshal to remove the same.

Sec. 6. A violation of any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, before the City Recorder, the offender or offenders, shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars, or more than fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the City jail, not less than two or more than twenty-five days, for each and every offense.
