Laid to Rest.

This community was deeply pained,
last Monday to hear of the death of
Mrs. Hattie C. Stoddard, wife of Fred
Stoddard and daughter of Judge Holden
and Mrs. Holden.

Mrs. Stoddard was taken sick on Mon-
day 6th and on Tuesday the disease
(Peritonitis) had already taken such
fearful hold of her that her life was almost
despaired of. On Thursday she seemed
to take a turn for the better but on Fri-
day she suffered a relapse and Monday
morning death came to the relief of the
sufferer. Friday her brother Chester
was sent for and arrived on Saturday
in time for a last sad farewell.

Mrs. Stoddard was born in Tillamook
in 1878 and was at the time of her death
but 20 years of age. On Aug. 22d 1895
she was married to Fred B. Stoddard.
One child was born to the young couple.
Mrs. Stoddard was a very handsome
woman, and possessed of an excellent
mind and great independence of charac-
ter and was universally respected and
beloved. The funeral took place on
Tuesday afternoon from the Presbyterian
Church, the services being conducted by
Pastor Gregg. The body was laid to
rest in Johnson's Cemetery. The
sympathy of this community go out to
Mr. and Mrs. Holden and family, and
especially to the little orphan left with-
out a mother's care, in their affliction.

Wild Geese Domesticated

Mr. Leonard Simmons, of Nestocton
has an interesting flock of native wild
geese, which upsets many of the popular
ideas about these birds. Mr. Simmons
winged a few wild geese nearly twenty
years ago, and as soon as they became
quite tame he kept them, and made
them useful as decoys for their untrain-
ed relations. This worked so well that
the tame birds would often lead into
their pen from one to two wild geese,
which in their turn were readily reduced
to friendly terms with man, and stayed
contentedly on the farm.

After keeping them fourteen years
one goose began to lay and has raised a
brood every year since, until last year
when a change of pasture seems to have
disagreed with her ideas of life. Mr.
Simmons has sold and killed for the
table, a great many of these birds and
still has between 30 and 40 on hand.
They readily cross with the domestic
white geese also, but the progeny is not
an improvement on the original stock.
It may be, however, that a bird can be
originated with the good qualities of the
wild bird and without their migrating
habits.
