Battle of the Standards.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—(Oregonian office Post building.)—"The battle of the standards must be fought at this fall and again in 1900," said Representative Tongue, in conversation with an Oregonian reporter. "It is a fight between the gold standard and the free coinage of silver," he continued, "and there can be no getting around the issue. For my part, I am ready for the contest. I shall go into it with a conviction that right will prevail and that the triumph of a sound financial policy will be overwhelming. Of course, we know that it is possible to lumber matters somewhat and that some men who believe in the gold standard and in maintaining the parity of all money may be frightened by the proposition to retire the greenbacks, and the various propositions for a national banking system, and hesitate about voting for the safe and sound financial policy."

Representative Tongue had a talk with the speaker about the condition in Oregon. Mr. Reed has manifested a great deal of interest in the state, and the conditions that exist, because he realizes that the results in Oregon cannot but have their effect upon the campaigns for congress in the other states. Mr. Tongue told the speaker that Oregon was a gold-standard state that while some people might shy somewhat at the word "gold," yet they believed in the maintenance of the present standard and were not in favor of silver monometallic and the silver standard, which free coinage would mean. At the same time he said that there were a great many people who were not yet ready for the retirement of the greenbacks, and the substitution in their place of a national bank currency, which was theoretical in its present shape. He told the speaker that men who would support the republican party and honor might object to the retirement of national greenbacks, and when a vote was lost on the ground of retiring the greenbacks, or the different financial measures which were proposed by some of the eastern men it was not only lost on that proposition, but went over completely into the free-silver camp. There was no middle ground for these men; when they did not vote for the republican candidate they would vote for a silver man out and out. Mr. Tongue told the speaker that he did not believe any of the radical measures proposed in congress for a complete reformation of the currency could be passed, and he believed that in pushing them many republican seats would be lost in the congressional elections.

Mr. Tongue is not the only republican who has such views, as many believe that the people are not yet educated up to the point where the more elaborate schemes of currency reform meet their approval, and that if they leave the sound money ranks because they are afraid the gold men have gone too far, they will not stop short of absolute free silver, because there is really no other landing place for them.—Oregonian

Notice to Taxpayers.

The law requires each male between the ages of 21 and 50 years living within the county shall pay a poll tax of one dollar (\$1.) at the time of assessment, and if not so paid, to be reported to the Sheriff of the County, with added costs, for collection at once. The law allows no exemption for poll tax, except to active members of the Oregon National Guard. And all active firemen who have been members of any company, for one year next preceding the time of assessment, and exempt firemen. That they may be no cause for complaint, I ask that each person liable to poll tax be prepared to pay the same to the assessor, or his deputy, at the time of making the assessment. I ask the aid of every person in the county, that the law may be strictly complied with. Persons exempt will be required to show their certificate of exemption.

Will Retaliate.

It seems that vigorous action is likely to be taken by the government in regard to the recent decree of Germany excluding all American fruits from her markets. This wholesale and unjust exclusion is made on the flimsy pretext that American fruit introduces into Germany certain vermin and pests injurious to the fruit interests of that country. That Germany has a perfect right to establish such regulations as will protect her growers from foreign injurious insects is easily conceded, but in the case in point no examination of consignments whatever has been made, but all fruit and nursery stock, good and bad alike, was forbidden to cross the border, thus entailing great hardship upon her exporters. This is in line with the action of that country concerning the importation of American meat products, around which such ridiculous and unnecessary restrictions were hedged that the result was to largely exclude them from Germany's market. This was exactly what was desired by her, and this is exactly what is hoped for in this matter of fruits. The truth is that our farm products have been so favorably received in the German markets that her officials view with alarm the proportions to which our trade is growing, and stealing away their own home market, and their intention is evident to do everything possible to harass our merchants to such an extent that they will desert German markets. It is understood that the United States officials have made pointed protests against this unjust discrimination, and it is thought that the President may take sharp retaliatory action, unless the Germans see the un wisdom of their action and recede from their position.
