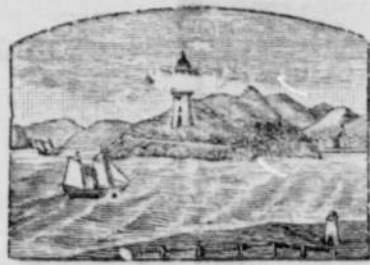

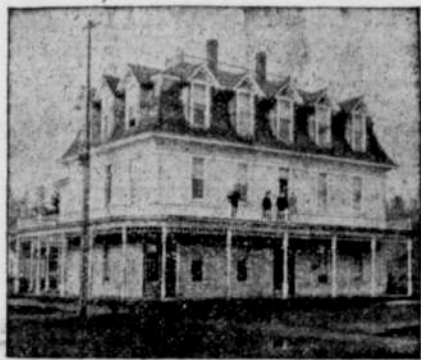

Republican Committee Meets.

The Tillamook County Republican Central Committee held a meeting on the 26th, of February at the office of Handley & Handley, T. B. Handley, chairman presiding.

It was decided to hold but one convention.

The following resolution was adopted.

Resolved that no person is entitled to vote in the republican primaries of this county who will not pledge himself to support the ticket to be nominated by its delegates.

It was decided to hold the county convention at the county court house on Saturday, April 21, 1898, and that the primaries be held March 26th.

The following ratio was adopted as a basis for computing the number of delegates to the county convention, viz one delegate for every ten voters and one for every fraction of five or more votes cast for Hon. G. H. Tongue for congress in 1896, and one delegate at large from each precinct. The representation would therefore be as follows: Barnegat 2, Bay 7, Beaver 2, Blaine 1, Carnahan 2, Dolph 2, Fairview 8, Foley 2, Garibaldi 7, Hebo 3, Hoquartion 5, Tillamook 9, Little Nestucca 3, Nehalem 7, Netarts 4, Sandlake 3, South Prairie 3, Woods 3. Total 72.

It was decided that Hoquartion and Tillamook precincts be allowed delegates on a vote of 50 and 80 respectively.

The following resolutions was then passed.

Resolved that this committee deems it unwise to discriminate in federal patronage between the republican newspapers of this county and we respectfully suggest that the interests of the party will be aided by a fair distribution of the Land Office patronage between the republican papers of this county.

By unanimous consent it was ordered that the committee recommend that the several precincts elect at the primary meetings a Precinct Committee of three, the chairman of whom shall be a member of the County Central Committee.

The Committee then adjourned.
