Call for Congressional Convention for the First District

A republican convention for the First congressional district of Oregon is hereby called to meet in the city of Eugene on Monday, April 11, 1898, at the hour of 2:30 o'clock P. M. for the purpose of nominating a candidate for congress for the First congressional district of Oregon, and to transact such other business as may properly come before said convention.

The same being one delegate at large for each county and one delegate for each 200 votes and fraction thereof of 50 or over, as cast for William McKinley at the presidential election held in November, 1896.

The committee recommends that the primaries be held on Saturday, April 3d, and the county convention on Wednesday, April 6, 1898, unless otherwise ordered by the several county committees.

What the Klondike Stampede Means to Trade.

What does an exodus of 100,000 to the Klondike mean to the business of the country? I have figured it out on the basis of cost and proportion as ascertained, and it is this: That each man of them would average first and last an expenditure of \$600, making a grand total of \$60,000,000. The United States railroads would get \$5,000,000 of this; Seattle merchants and hotel keepers, for outfits transient guests, \$25,000,000; the prospector's home town and town en route to Seattle and other Pacific coast points, \$5,000,000; ship companies, for transportation to Alaska; \$10,000,000; and for transportation of freight over passes and in Alaska, \$15,000,000.

Speed of the Earth.

The earth loses in its daily rotation round its axis, twenty-two seconds each century, the main causes of such loss being the friction caused by the tides, which act as a brake, and is equal in weight to some four million tons, applied on the equator; other causes are the annual growth, and melting of snow and ice at the poles affect the earth's motion. The growth, by abstracting the water from the other part of the ocean, accelerates the earth's motion, and the melting, by restoring the water, retards it. The increase in the size of the earth due to the falling on it of meteoric dust, which if deposited at the rate of one foot in four thousand years, would, it is assumed, produce the above amount of loss by itself.
