The Democratic County Central Committee met on Saturday at the Woodmen Hall, J. D. Edwards, chairman, called the committee to order and G. B. Johnson acted as secretary.

The various precincts were represented as follows:
Hoquartion, J. D. Edwards; Tillamook Theo. Steinhilber; Fairview, Sam Downs; South Prairie, John Sheets; Carnahan, Wm Schlatter; Netarts, G. W. Phelps; Sandlake, A. Hembree; Beaver, H. Gessner; Blaine, N. Coulson; Hebo, Wm. Rhoades (by A. E. Lucy, proxy); Dolph, G. S. Nelson; Union, A. E. Lucy; Little Nestucca, J. K. Craven. Bay and Barnegat precincts were not represented.

The committee set April 30th, at 10 A. M. as the time for holding the county convention and April 23d as the date for the primaries, the hour for the primaries being left to the precinct committee.

The basis of representation to the county convention, will be the vote cast for Wm. J. Bryan for President in 1896 and will give the precincts the following representation. A Miser's Estate.

James Christensen living at Spruce in this county, has handed to us the following clipping:

STOCKTON, Cal., March 1.—Peter Christensen, a wealthy bachelor farmer, who died a few weeks ago on his ranch near Waterloo, in this county, left an estate worth upwards of \$100,000, and so far as known, no heir of his resides this side of Denmark. Public Administrator Norton is in charge of the estate as administrator, no will having been found. It was known the old man had a will prepared for him, but it was thought it had not been executed.

Now comes the story that he made a will several years ago and left it with the late Judge Baldwin. Since the death of Baldwin the document was mailed to Christensen, and after lying in the postoffice here three days, was sent to the dead-letter office and is in Washington.

Efforts are being made to get the document, which it is said will give large bequests to old friends of the eccentric miser.

Mr. Christensen is almost certain that the Peter Christensen mentioned is his father's brother and that he is therefore entitled to a share in the estate.
