In the matter of the Ed Blum county road, it appearing to the court that the petition was signed by more than twelve householders; that the petition properly specified the road, that the proper notice had been given for the required time and that the bond for costs had been given it was ordered that I. C. Quick, F. M. Lamb and Albert Harris be appointed viewers and A. M. Austin be appointed surveyor of said road.

It appearing that a certain tract of land in Tp. 7, S. R. 10 W was wrongfully assessed to W. R. Keeter and sold for taxes under said assessment the sale was cancelled.

It appearing that a certain tract of land in Sec 36 Tp 2 N R 7 W was wrongfully assessed in 1895 to Edward H. Rankin and subsequently sold for taxes, the sale was cancelled.

The county clerk was ordered to advertise for sealed bids for the building a bridge across Kilchis River on the road leading from Tillamook to Bay City, said bids to be filed with the county clerk on or before the 4th day of May 1898 at 9 o'clock A. M.

In the matter of the petition of H. F. Goodspeed et al for a county road from Honer Mason's place West to tide land. It appearing to the court that the petition was properly signed, that it properly specified the route of the road and that the proper notice had been given, it was ordered that M. H. Harrison, M. V. Stillwell and John Erickson be appointed viewers and A. M. Austin surveyor of the proposed route.

H. A. Bloom supervisor of RD No 1, John Hickey sup. of R D No 2 S. M. Daly sup of R D No 4 J. J. McGinnis sup. of R. D. No 5, and Richard Allen sup of R D No 6 filed their bonds and the same were approved.

The order allowing justice Smith 2.45 and constable Booth, 1.20 in the case of state vs B. Brier was vacated on request of justice Smith who wrote that they had been paid by the defendant.

It appearing that certain lands belonging to H. W. Cottle had been wrongfully assessed in 1895 and subsequently sold for taxes the sale was ordered cancelled.

In the matter of selecting a county official newspaper, certain motions were made by the attorneys for the Herald and disposed of by the court after which the matter was continued until the May term.

The court checked up the bills allowed and warrants drawn by the county

clerk last year and found to be correct. Judge Conder was allowed \$83.33 as salary for Jan. & Feb. and D. P. Harvey, was allowed \$12.20. Court then adjourned.
