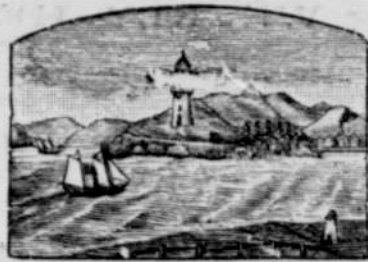

A special dispatch from Forest Grove
to the HEADLIGHT states that in the
prize-fight between Peter Jackson the
colored champion and Jim Jeffries in
San Francisco on the 24, Jackson was
knocked out in the third round. The
result was quite a surprise to sporting
men generally.

P. McIntosh, our enterprising creamery
man, is talking very strongly of putting
in a creamery in the South end of the
county. We trust that he may conclude
to do so, as the enterprise is much
needed and will doubtless prove
mutually advantageous to the proprietor
of the creamery, and the farmers.

A special dispatch to the HEADLIGHT
from Forest Grove states that the
schooner Alma which sailed for Dyea
some time ago with a crew and passen-
ger list of 40 persons, has drifted ashore
near the Golden gate, bottom up.
Nothing whatever has been heard of
the crew and it is feared that all
hands perished.

The Steamer Harrison which sailed
from Astoria or Tillamook last week
sprung a leak in her boilers and it was
found necessary to return. On inspection
it was found that extensive repairs
were necessary. A portion of the cargo
was removed and placed on the Elmore
and brought to its destination. The
Harrison will probably be in Monday
or Tuesday.

The Town Council held a meeting on
Monday evening. The only business
transacted was the passage of four or-
dinances, as follows: No. 101, An Ordinance
for Construction of Certain Side-
walks; No. 102, An Ordinance Providing
for Protection Against Fire; No. 103
An Ordinance Creating the Office of Fire
Warden, and Defining his Powers, and
Ordinance No. 104, An Ordinance Pro-
hibiting the Ringing of the Fire Bell,
except for Fire Alarms.

A sheriffs jury consisting of David
Sexton, W. B. Stillwell, Wm. McCarger,
John Mann, A. A. Ford and W. H. Rey-
nolds was impanelled last Monday to de-
cide the ownership of certain cattle sold
two weeks or more ago by Alois Van-
neuhenhize to John Monroe. Jacob
Frayne had obtained a deficiency judg-
ment against Vanneuhenhize for \$200,
and the sheriff had levied on the cattle
in question. Monroe claimed the cattle
in virtue of a bill of sale which he held,
while Frayne claimed that the cattle had
been fraudulently transferred to get them
out of the sheriffs way. T. B. Handley
represented Vanneuhenhize. The jury
decided in favor of Frayne.

Back from Klondike.

Last Thursday evening Carl Hunt, who
has been absent in the mines for five
years, returned to his home in Tilla-
mook. Mr. Hunt left Tillamook 5 years
ago for the Kootnai Mining District. He
remained in that district for about two
years, meeting with such indifferent
success that when the Alaska excitement
broke out, he at once left for the new
diggings, arriving in Juneau in due
course of time. The mining about
Juneau is mostly quartz mining, and
requires considerable capital to engage
in it successfully. Mr. Hunt remained
at Juneau only about two months, and
then struck out for far away Circle City,
where he remained for the balance of
the season working on Birch Creek.
Thus far he had not struck any-
thing particularly rich, so, when the
account of the fabulous wealth of the
Klondike diggings reached Circle City,
Mr. Hunt and his partner, Chris Neebur,
left for the new El Dorado. They got to
Dawson City about Feb. 1st, 1897 and
found quite an excitement prevailing.
All the original miners on the ground
had located claims and the men on 40
Mile Creek had abandoned their claims,
and located in the new diggings. Messrs
Hunt and Neebur, however, succeeded in
getting three excellent claims, the Bon-
anza about 10 miles above Dawson and
two others, one on Dominion Creek and
the other on Sulphur Creek. From these
three claims they reaped a rich harvest
indeed, and having obtained enough to
satisfy ordinary mortals, they left for
home on the 11th, of last December,
crossing the terrible Chilkoot pass and
arriving in Dyea in due time, whence
they took ship for Seattle. At that City
they met with some representatives of
eastern capitalists to whom they finally
sold their claims, after which Mr. Neebur
went to Iowa where his mother resides
and Mr. Hunt returned to his home in
Tillamook.

Mr. Hunt says that nearly all the men
who arrived in Dawson at the time he
did, have either grown wealthy or made
enough to give them a start in life, but,
thinks that unless new diggings are dis-
covered, the chances will not be so good
in the future. The best claims are all
in the hands of capitalists and with the
rapid influx of laborers, wages will
certainly come down. He does not ad-
vise any one to go, nor does he counsel
them to stay at home. The country is
open, its hardships are known and the
chances of failure and success can be
computed by each one for himself. Mr.
Hunt would lay special stress on two
things: The man who goes to Alaska
should be physically strong, and be
abundantly supplied with provisions.
Then he should make up his mind to
stay until luck favors him be that one,
two, or five years.

Mr. Hunt has sold all his interests and
does not expect to return. He is more
than ever impressed with the desirability
of Tillamook as a place to invest money
and will remain here, at least for the
present. He is hale and hearty and
physically little the worse for his five
years in the northern mines, though the
hardships he has passed through are
certainly not to be easily forgotten.
The size of his fortune is his own affair,
but whatever it is he is the same old
Carl as he was when he left, a poor man
five years ago.
