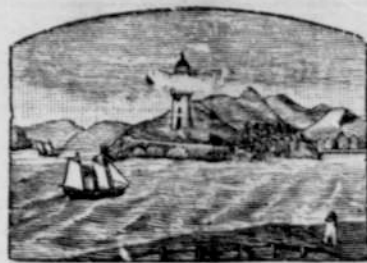

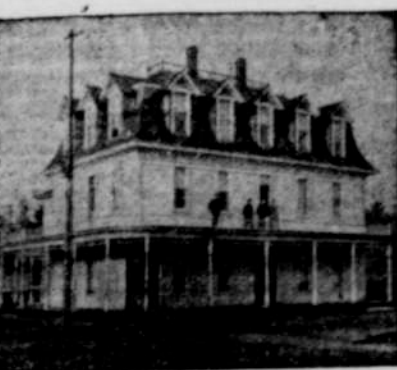

It is reported on the streets that it is

We are indebted to J. G. Holcombe
U. S. Engineer for a copy of the last
Annual Report upon the Improvement
of Rivers and Harbors in Oregon and
Washington. The Report contains
much that is of interest to our people,
including a very accurate map of the
bar and entrance to Tillamook Bay. We
shall notice the Report more at length,
hereafter.

Two rival menageries have started up
in town and a great deal of jealousy exists
between the proprietors. B. C. Lamb
owns the first which consists of half a
dozen guinea pigs. Hon. Geo. Cohn has
the second. It consists of a California
horned toad which was captured on the
desert near Pasadena and shipped north
in a strong cage by Hon. E. E. Selph.
Mr. Selph instructed Mr. Cohn to feed
the reptile on climate and principle.
The toad is getting quite poor from lack
of nourishment.

Sheriff Alderman received a letter from
ex-sheriff Jackson, a few days ago.
It was dated, Jackson Creek Mining
District, Alaska, Nov. 23, 1897. It
states that the District in question is
near the Yukon, 300 miles west of Daw-
son at which point they were caught in
the ice Sept. 29th, 1897. On Oct. 25th,
Mr. Jackson and one companion took to
the mountains following a small creek.
They soon discovered gold, and return-
ing led a party there and formed a camp
naming it the Jackson Creek Mining
District. Mr. Jackson is enthusiastic
over the prospects though he admits
that the county is a hard country for the
"tenderfoot". Gold is found every-
where averaging 5 cts to the pan.

Very few candidates have thus far
announced themselves.

For Joint Representative the only
candidate prominently mentioned thus
far, is Hon. J. W. Maxwell formerly
Joint Senator from this senatorial district.

For County Clerk the most prominent
candidate mentioned is Homer Mason.
H. N. Alley has also been mentioned in
connection with the office.

For sheriff the only candidate who has
publicly announced himself, is H. H.
Alderman. Other candidates will prob-
ably be forthcoming when the conven-
tion meets.

For Treasurer the names of Howard
Cary, Geo. Edmunds, Al. Letcher and
Nels Thompson are named as candidates.

For Assessor, two names have been
most prominently mentioned, those of
the present incumbent, Mr. Stephens
and ex-assessor A. T. White.

For the office of County Judge, four
gentlemen are spoken of for
nomination, Judge Cooper, Justice
Sappington, Mark Harrison and Jeptha
Mr. Rogers of South Prairie.

For Superintendent of Schools there
are thus far only two candidates, Prof.
Vincent, of Beaver, and George Lamb of
South Prairie, now at the Monmouth
State Normal School where he will
graduate in June.

For County Commissioner from the
south end of the county three gentlemen
have been spoken of, Charles Ray, of
Woods, Jasper Smith, of Hebo and
Herman Farmer, of Sandlake. Other
candidates will probably be forthcom-
ing on the day of the convention.

For County Surveyor we have not
heard any one named but Mr. Austin
will probably receive the nomination.

The office of Coroner does not seem to
be much sought after and the only men
who have thus far signified their in-
tention of running for it are, J. E. Tuttle
and C. E. Reynolds.

For Justice of the Peace of this district
W. H. Reynolds, Tom Goyne and Z.
Wells are candidates and for Constable,
Gordon West, Sid Anderson, A. A. Ford
Elmer Hoag and Addie Harris will con-
test for the nomination.

The convention will be held in the
Opera House and will convene prompt-
ly at 10 o'clock A. M.
