The Arthur I, was stranded, broken to pieces and came ashore at different points from Fletcher's camp ground to Proposal rock at the mouth of Slab Creek last week. In all probability the boat has been drifting helplessly for some time. Nothing has been heard from the crew, from any part of the coast. The small boats had been lowered and manned or else they had been broken loose and are still adrift.

Indications are that she broke to pieces when she struck the spit as her hatches and water cask came in near the place where the hull came in. She is a total loss. The farmers near by have secured some of the iron, chains, blocks, etc.

The Arthur I, was a schooner of 123 tons register, built at Benicia, Cal., in 1898, by Matthew Turner, one of the best known builders of sailing crafts on the Pacific coast. She was 97 feet long, 27.2 feet beam, and 7.5 feet depth of hold.
