**Republican County Convention**

The Republican Convention was called to order promptly at 10 o'clock A. M. on Saturday by chairman Handley, of the County Central Committee. Mr. Handley made a brief address calling attention to the importance of the occasion and of the issues which were to come before the convention. He outlined briefly the condition of the county two years ago and its much better condition today under the administration of President McKinley. His reference to Hon. F. T. Geer as the probable next Governor of Oregon and Hon. Thomas H. Tongue as his own successor in Congress elicited great applause. At the close of the address the convention proceeded to business.

Hon. T. B. Handley was elected temporary chairman, and Chas. Johnson, of Garibaldi, was elected temporary secretary.

On motion of Abe Severance, the following committee on credentials was appointed by the chairman: A. W. Severance, A. McNair, S. H. Rock, S. Robedece and M. Reading.

On motion of G. W. Sappington, a committee on order of business was appointed; G. W. Sappington, Peter Byron, C. B. Wiley, Bert Biggs, and W. G. West.

Geo. Johnson was elected Sergeant at Arms and at once proceeded to build a fire.

The convention was called to order promptly at one o'clock p. m. and as the committee was not yet ready to report a number of gentlemen were called upon to make short speeches among those who responded were editor D. K. Bowman, of the HEADLIGHT, B. L. Eddy and T. B. Handley.

The report of the committee on credentials reported the following, entitled to seats.

- The item relating to Nehalem provoked considerable discussion but was finally adopted.
- The committee on permanent order of business reported as follows:  
That the temporary officers be made the permanent officers of the convention.  
That an assistant secretary be elected.  
That the nomination of candidates be made by ballot and a majority of all votes cast be required to nominate; nominations to be made as follows:  
1st Nomination for County Judge, 21 County Commissioner, 3d Clerk, 4th Sheriff, 5th Treasurer, 6th Assessor, 7th Surveyor, 8th School Supt., 9th Coroner, 10th Recommendation for joint representative, 11th election of 5 delegates to attend the 21 congressional district and state conventions.
- The committee also recommended that the 1st, 2d & 3d justice districts nominate district officers.
- An informal ballot taken on county judge resulted as follows:  
G. W. Sappington, 39, J. H. Cooper, 29, Mark Harrison, 9, W. T. West, 2,

Mont Goodspeed, 2, Mr. Sappington was declared the nominee of the convention.

A vote was taken by all the precincts south of South Prairie for the nomination of a county commissioner.

The first was as follows, H. H. Hays, S. Seth F. Moan, 3, and Chas. Ray, 10.

The second ballot was as follows; Hays 7, Ray, 19.

The Rules were suspended and Chas. Ray was nominated by acclamation.

The next nomination to be made was that of county clerk and the vote resulted as follows; Homer Mason 43, A. McNair 22, A. T. White 2, H. V. Alley 2, C. N. Drew 4, and blank 1. Mr. Mason was declared the nominee of the convention.

The nomination of sheriff was then taken up and the vote resulted as follows: H. H. Alderman 63, A. L. Sanders 8, blank 1. Mr. Alderman was declared the nominee of the convention.

For Treasurer there were only two candidates, Howard Cary, and Nels Thompson, Mr. Cary received 54 votes and Mr. Thompson 20. Mr. Cary was declared the nominee of the convention.

For county assessor there were two names submitted, J. S. Stephens and A. T. White. Mr. White received two votes and Mr. Stephens 70, and he was thereupon declared the nominee of the convention.

A. M. Austin was then nominated for county surveyor by acclamation.

The nomination for county coroner was then taken up and the vote resulted as follows J. E. Tuttle 34 C. E. Reynolds 28 and Dr. Hawk 12.

The second ballot resulted as follows: Reynolds 15 Tuttle 35 and Hawk 24.

On the third ballot Mr. Tuttle received 37 votes and Dr. Hawk 36, Mr. Tuttle was declared the nominee of the convention.

Nomination for school Supt. was then taken up and the vote resulted as follows; Geo. B. Lamb 38, F. R. Smith 23 and F. D. Vincent 6, Mr. Lamb was declared the nominee of the convention.

The vote for nominee for joint representative resulted as follows; J. W. Maxwell 49, C. A. Johnson 24, S. F. Mages 14, A. W. Severance 1, blank 1.

For delegates to the state convention the following gentlemen were named, T. B. Handley, A. McNair, Jasper Smith, J. W. Maxwell and Chas. Ray.

After the election of delegates to the State Convention, the convention adjourned for 30 minutes to give the justice districts and opportunity to nominate.

The second district organized with Abe Severance as chairman and A. McNair secretary. T. H. Goyne was thereupon nominated as Justice of the Peace, and A. A. Ford as Constable.

The first district organized and nominated Jas. S. Gray for Justice of the Peace and A. Klein for Constable.

The 3d district organized with W. G. West in the chair and H. E. Chapman, secretary. S. R. Finley was nominated for Justice of the Peace and Hans Jensen for constable.

The Convention was then called to order and all the district nominations ratified.

The County Central Committee was announced to be as follows:

Hoskins; Garibaldi, Peter Byron; Hebo, A. D. Sanders; Hoquarton, A. W. Severance; Little Nestucca, L. M. Commons; Netarts, W. A. High; Union, W. R. Robedece; Sandlake, W. C. King; South Prairie, O. B. Lawrence; Tillamook, C. N. Drew; Nehalem, James S. Gray.

The convention then adjourned. The convention was pronounced by all who attended it the very best ever held in this county. Every delegate went home feeling that the ticket nominated is a good one and determined to do all he can for its election. Republicans generally are well pleased over the work of the convention and democrats admit that the ticket is one of unusual strength.

**Latest War News.**  
The following dispatches were received last night at 8 P. M. from Forest Grove. They indicate that war is at most an absolute certainty.  
WASHINGTON, April 7.—It is absolutely certain that the President's message will provoke war. The President stated to-day that out of regard to the safety of General Lee and other Americans in Cuba he would not send his message to Congress until they were safely out of Cuba. Another delay of 5 days is therefore imperative. The message will positively go in on Monday.  
General Lee had already embarked 2500 Americans for home and the rest of the Americans in Cuba will be safely on board the ships sent by Sunday evening.  
It is now conceded in official circles that war is inevitable and can not be averted.  
The insurgents ask of America that their independence be recognized before America intervenes. Otherwise intervention will not be acceptable.  
**THURSDAY**  
4:00 P. M.—War averted. The Cubans will be free. The Queen of Spain grants an amistie preliminary to a recognition of independence.  
Question may yet be settled without bloodshed.  
A royal peace will probably be declared.
