### Instructions to Road Supervisors.

Keep a correct account of the time worked by each person working on the roads. Be sure that you spell every person's name correctly. Ask the person, if you do not know how to spell his name.

Give time checks to every one who performs work on the roads, and be sure that the time given in check corresponds to the time on your time book.

Fill out the stubs to time checks and have them signed by the person to whom you give the check.

Have your deputies sign checks and certificates with your name, by him. Remember that every male in the county, between the ages of 21 yrs. and 50 yrs. who is subject to a State poll tax, is also subject to a road tax of \$2.00. Therefore it is your duty, and the law requires you, to keep a close watch throughout your district for all such persons and if their names are not on your tax list, put them on said tax list, in alphabetical order and assess them with each \$2.00.

If, at any time you hire a man to work on the road who is under the age of 21 years, or over the age of 50 years, you must note this fact on your time book by saying "not subject to poll tax," and make said note on your returns to the court. It is your duty, under an agreement of the court, to hire each man to work on the road to the amount of road tax levied against him; provided he wishes to work, and will render good and efficient work for same.

In keeping time you will remember that a team and wagon is allowed the same pay as a man. Therefore if you hire a man with his team and wagon, allow him 2 days on your count instead of 1 day. Eight hours shall be deemed a days work, and \$1.25 per day allowed.

Show no partiality toward anyone in management, or work; give every man a fair showing.

The court, or some member thereof, will instruct you how to do the work, and when and where to do it.

Before you begin work on any portion of your road make up your mind what kind of tools it will be necessary to use and otherwise how to manage, to facilitate and expedite the work so that when the men come out to work, you will not have to stop to argue the matter.

Always keep your work planned ahead so as to keep your men employed to the best advantage.

You are furnished with ruled sheets of paper, with certificates to attach, upon which you will transfer from your time book in alphabetical order the names, time, rate and total amount due each person, from the date of last report to the time you make next report. Compare the time so transferred with the time on your time books, and checks and see that they correspond. Make a check mark on time books opposite name, thus -X-, when you have compared them, to indicate that you have transferred them and turned them into the court. After doing this you will then sign certificate, attach it to list and send the sheet or sheets with the check stubs to the County Clerk in time to reach him before court convenes at each term thereof, which will be during the remainder of the year, 1898, May 4th, July 6th, Sept. 7th, and Nov. 9th. If there should be any adjourned or called terms of court during the year, you will be notified in time to send them in. Retain the time books in your possession until called for, or to the end of the year.
