indicates, its primary object is the destruction of torpedo-boats, but it combines the qualities of the torpedo-boat, the gun-boat and the cruiser. It is larger and swifter than the torpedo boat some of them rushing through the water, at the rate of thirty-four miles an hour, as fast as the average express train. Besides the torpedo tubes, it carries guns of the rapid-firing variety as large as 14-pounders. With such speed and such armament it can run down and sink the speediest torpedo-boat, while—without using its torpedoes, which are reserved for warships—it can capture, and destroy if necessary, commercial vessels of large size. In attacking war vessels, however, it is not as effective as the torpedo-boat, because its larger size and higher fire board makes it more easily and a better target for the guns of the battleship.

HOW TO FIND OUT.

Torpedo-Boats and Destroyers.

The importance attached by naval authorities to the little boats now on their way from Spain to West Indian waters is a source of astonishment to the people who have paid no attention to recent developments in naval architecture. Torpedo-boats have been popularly known for some time as war craft of potential possibilities, but in actual use more dangerous to their owners than to the enemy. Torpedo-boat destroyers are apparently a type of vessel absolutely unheard of by the majority, and the manner in which they are mixed up in the news reports with the craft they are supposedly intended to annihilate is certainly mystifying.

The torpedo-boat of to-day, it should be stated in the beginning, is no longer a vessel of doubtful value. Its terrible powers has been shown on several occasions in recent years. While it is designed primarily as a coast defense vessel, and it is not especially fitted for long voyages on the high seas, it has been made as stable and safe as any small boat can be. It can move faster than any battleship or cruiser, and owing to its small size and low free board, can steal up within a few hundred yards of a warship, discharge its projectile under water with considerable accuracy and dart away without being seen, perhaps; or, if seen, can laugh at the efforts of the big vessels to capture her. The torpedoes which she sends forth on their errand of destruction are sufficient powerful to sink any man-of-war that a battleship has from these terrible little engines of war in her guns, which, if seen in time, may sink the torpedo-boat; or in the protective net of large iron rings which is hung around the ship when in danger. But the torpedo-boat is so small that it is hard to hit her even in daylight, and her attacks are generally made at night, while the torpedo nets are of doubtful efficiency. The torpedo-boats are from 100 to 150 feet long and have an average draught of about 5 feet, so that they can slip into shallow water or up steers if necessary. They have a complement of from twenty to twenty-five officers and men and carry three or four 100-pounder rifles for defense and as many torpedo tubes for offense. The torpedo-boat destroyer is the result of the development of the torpedo boat. As its name
