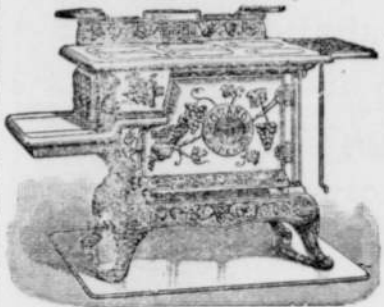

Latest War News.

TUESDAY 10:45 A. M.

The War drum is rolling. Congress
has thrown down the gauntlet to Spain.
The Cuban resolution passed this morn-
ing.

After years of peace the nation is again
on the eve of a conflict. Thrilling scenes
were enacted in both houses of congress
within the last two days. The bitterest
contend within the history of the Senate,
has just been concluded.

Troops are hurrying southward from
all sections of the country.

The House forced the Senate to yield
and its Cuban resolution was passed in
the house by a majority of 310 to 6 and
in the Senate by a majority of 42 to 35.

The Oregonian says editorially this
morning that the President will not veto
the bill, but will sign it and probably
send in a message holding that in recog-
nizing the independence of Cuba, con-
gress has exceeded its bounds, that be-
ing the prerogative of the President al-
one.

The bill is now in the President's
hands. It recognizes the independence
of Cuba and provides for immediate
armed intervention. The bill also dis-
claims any designs on the island.

Following is the full text of the Cuban
resolution as it passed the Senate and
House of Representatives:

That the people of the Island, of Cuba
are and of right ought to be free and in-
dependent.

That it is the duty of the United States
of America to demand and the govern-
ment of the United States does hereby
demand that the government of Spain
does relinquish its authority and govern-
ment over the Island of Cuba and with-
draw its troops and naval forces from
Cuba and Cuban waters.

That the President of the United States
be and he is hereby directed and empow-
ered to use the land and naval forces of
the United States and to call into active
service of the United States the militia
of the several states to such an extent as
is necessary to carry this resolution into
effect.

That the United States hereby dis-
claims any disposition to control or
any jurisdiction or control over the Is-
land of Cuba except for the pacification
thereof, and when that is accomplished
to leave the island to the control of its
people.

TUESDAY 7:30 P. M.

Hostilities will be opened within 48
hours. The Cuban resolution has been
signed by the speaker of the House and
Vice President and has been submitted
to the President who will sign it this
afternoon after an ultimatum to Spain
has been prepared and drafted.

Spain will be allowed 24 or 48 hours
to comply with the demands of Congress
to evacuate Cuba and upon her refusal
of the United States will strike for Havana.

Plans have been formulated in Con-
gress for placing 200,000 soldiers at the
disposition of the government.

The Cabinet and war department have
decided that the first call issued will
be for 80,000 members of the militia of
the several states, 60,000 volunteers will
be called for. The standing army will
furnish 27,000 more and the army re-
organization bill will provide for 50,000
more.

War preparations are being rushed
every where.

Polo y Bernabe, the Spanish minister
will leave Washington as soon as the
Cuban resolution is signed by the Pres-
ident.

The Carlists are preparing for an in-
surrection in Spain. Don Carlos is on
the border waiting to take command of
the revolutionary forces.

WEDNESDAY 10:40 A. M.

Spain has been given notice to quit
Cuba. She is given 48 hours in which
to leave the island.

The joint resolutions will be signed
and cabled at the same time.

Compliance with the demand of this
country is not expected.

Spanish Minister Polo y Bernabe leaves
Washington to day.

All the European governments pro-
pose to observe the strictest neutrality.
England is sending soldiers to the
West Indies to enforce neutrality. She
does it for fear that either the Spaniards
or Americans will use her territory as a
basis of operations.

The Oregon Militia is ready. Nation-
al guardsmen are eager to volunteer.
Most of the men will go and there is a
general desire to keep companies to-
gether.

The President will sign the resolutions
to-day

WEDNESDAY 7:15 P. M.

The Madrid government has the Pres-
ident's ultimatum. It was signed this
morning, together with the Cuban reso-
lutions and forwarded at once to Minis-
ter Woodford at Madrid.

Spain was notified that her military
and naval forces must be withdrawn
from Cuba and Cuban waters not later
than Saturday. In case a satisfactory
response is not received the President
will proceed with armed forces to carry
the resolution into effect.

Increased activity in the war depart-
ment follows the announcement of the
President's ultimatum to Madrid.

Plans are being effected for an early
blockade of one or more of the principal
ports of Cuba and the bombardment,
if necessary, of their cities, and a dis-
posal of warships looking at these ends
is likely to begin within a few hours.

The movements of troops toward
southern ports of Mobilization now fair-
ly under way.

Minister Woodford is getting ready to
leave Spain immediately.

While our soldiers are hurrying south-
ward, Spanish troops are hurrying to-
ward Havana.

Minister Polo y Bernabe has received
his passports from Washington and em-
barked for Spain to-day.

THURSDAY NOON

Spain is given until Saturday noon to
answer to the President's ultimatum.
If she does not answer by that time, the
United States army and navy will move
on Cuba.

The full text of President McKinley's
ultimatum will be made public at that
time.

An official announcement has been
made that the United States will not re-
sort to privateering.

The Spanish squadron is still at Cape
Verdes.

The Spanish minister has left Wash-
ington for home, going by way of Hal-
ifax.

THURSDAY 1:30 P. M.

Spain has rejected the President ulti-
matum, and Minister Woodford has re-
ceived his passport for home.
