

WAR NEWS!!

FRIDAY 11:30 A. M.

Admiral Farran's object in firing on the fort at Matanzas was to secure that point as a base of operations for the United States army.

The U. S. Army is ready for a dash into Cuba. It will probably be landed at Matanzas soon. The intention is to strike a decisive blow before the beginning of the rainy season.

An auxiliary naval vessel, manned by navy reserves and armed with six pounders and rapid firing guns will be stationed at the mouth of the Columbia to guard against possible surprises.

The American ship Shenandoah, said to have been captured by Spanish privateers, arrived safely in Liverpool yesterday.

The Spanish fleet is short of coal. The Spanish destroyer "Destructor" is patrolling the Straights of Gibraltar.

France and Spain have given notice of neutrality. No apprehension is felt concerning Germany and Austria.

The Spanish fleet is near Manila in a concerted situation, waiting for Admiral Dewey's fleet.

The Spanish squadron left St. Vincent this morning. Its destination is unknown.

FRIDAY 7:30 P. M.

Spain made her first real move in the war today. Her fleet sailed from the Cape Verde Islands, 5 cruisers and 3 torpedo destroyers going west and the balance of the fleet going northward.

American warships are waiting at Manila and a naval battle at, or near Manila is likely to occur.

The gunboat Newport captured a Spanish ship off Cebu yesterday. The gunboat Machias shelled Cardenas, destroying the fortifications and killing many Spaniards to-day.

A large amount of Spanish mail has been confiscated and many letters were found containing information of value to the military and naval authorities. All Spanish mail hereafter will be sent to the dead letter office.

A Spanish officer who is fitted with the Spanish round at San Francisco last winter has the plans of the fortifications at that place and our authorities fear that danger threatens the city.

SATURDAY 10:30 A. M.

Everything is in order for a move on Cuba. The artillery is at Tampa. The commissary department has abundant supplies. The first landing of troops on Cuban soil will probably be at Sagua.

The Asiatic squadron under Commodore Dewey reached Manila last night, and is now at Manila. A battle is imminent. Dewey proposes to capture the Spanish fleet. The insurgents around Manila are fully armed and will cooperate with Dewey's fleet. News from Manila is scarce as the cable is under Spanish control and in the event of a battle and Spanish defeat, a lying dispatch will probably be sent out calling for a Spanish victory.

Bismarck is opposed to German neutrality, he wishes the hands of Germany left free. It is rumored that Germany will oppose the bombardment of Manila on account of large German interests there.

Spanish hopes blasted. The officers of the Spanish fleet fooled the people by lying reports and made them believe that the fleet had sailed long ago.

The American Haver St. Louis, St. Paul and Harvard have received their armament and are sailed for Spanish waters, where they will protect American boats and lay in wait for Spanish prizes.

Gladstone is sinking rapidly.

SATURDAY 9:30 P. M.

The Philippine battle is probably a thing of the past, though the truth concerning it will not be known until Dewey captures the cable. Old Manila will be in the hands of the insurgents in a couple of days. They have already captured the new town.

Gen. Terror reigns in Santiago de Cuba. Every man and boy who refuses to enlist in the Spanish army will be shot, mangled and shot. A general massacre is imminent.

The American liner Fries, now to be known as the auxiliary cruiser Yale, arrived safely in New York to-day with a cargo valued at \$3,000,000, mostly government supplies.

"Old Glory" will soon wave over Hawaii and an American yacht club will be proclaimed. Matanzas will again be bombarded, to prevent the Spaniards from replacing their batteries.

The U. S. dispatch boat Dolphin captured the Spanish schooner Lollie today.

There are Spanish spies in all our seaport cities.

A dispatch from Manila from Spanish sources states that a great battle has been fought between Admiral Dewey's fleet and the Spanish fleet. The dispatches indicate a complete victory for the Americans. They admit the loss of three Spanish cruisers and that three other Spanish vessels had to be sunk to keep them from falling into the hands of the Americans. Nothing is said of the loss of any American warships but it is claimed that many Americans were killed and wounded. It is believed that when the truth becomes known it will be found that the American fleet gained a complete and glorious victory.

MONDAY 11:30 A. M.

A great naval battle has been fought at Manila. Commodore Dewey's fleet met the Spanish fleet, entirely destroying 3 Spanish cruisers and damaging others. The loss to the Americans was very light. After the battle the American fleet entered the harbor and landed its wounded.

The American fleet entered the harbor at night and completely surprised the Spaniards. A crushing defeat for Spain is all that the dispatches make clear. No damage to the American ships is mentioned.

Dewey's victory may end the war. Spain has learned her weakness by bitter experience. The Philippines are utterly lost to Spain. The Powers of Europe will now probably induce Spain to give up the uneven contest.

Blanco says he will make a desperate effort to save Cuba. Bartholomew is being thrown up on the beach. A crushing defeat for Spain is all that the dispatches make clear. No damage to the American ships is mentioned.

The battle ship Oregon will soon be in Cuban waters accompanied by the gunboats Marietta and the Nechewa. The three ships were at Rio Janeiro yesterday.

MONDAY 7:30 P. M.

The Spanish government admits that its fleet at Manila was utterly demolished, but declares that the war will be continued. The dispatches from Manila commended this morning. The Governor-general was asked to surrender, but refused, and Admiral Dewey promptly opened fire on the city. Only one American vessel was damaged. A special dispatch to the United States states that a flag of truce was sent to Dewey yesterday, that the Spanish have surrendered the city. Germany did not post a word against the bombardment, but informed Dewey that her own interests would suffer.

Yours will leave Tampa for Cuba Tuesday night. They will land at Matanzas and immediately assume the offensive. The war department has declared for immediate action. Some of the fleet will move to lay for the coast of Cuba.

A heavy storm is raging which may delay the opening of the Cuban campaign.

The plans of the insurgents in the Philippines is to have a respectable and place it under an American protectorate.
