**The Joint Discussion.**  
The joint discussion between Hon. J. D. Stevens the fusionist orator and Hon. T. B. Handley, at the Opera House on Thursday evening was rather slimly attended but full of interest to those who were present. Mr. Stevens led off in a speech of an hour. He is evidently sincere but his speech was a rambling effort full of bold assertions which he did not take the trouble to prove. It was the same old argument that Billy Bryan offered in '96 and which the events of the past have proven false a hundred times. Mr. Stevens dug up the alleged venerable crime of 73 and held it up to his weeping sympathizers, referred to (but did not quote) scripture to prove that 16 to 1 is the legal ratio of coinage of silver and gold. He contended that government obligations were payable in gold and silver coin, that gold was appreciating in value constantly, that the people want more and cheaper money, that there is no money that is not a result of law, that the fiat of the government makes money, that there isn't enough money in existence to pay all debts with, that a gold basis or gold reserve is unnecessary, that every body wants cheaper money etc., etc.  
Mr. Handley met all of Mr. Stevens' arguments and answered them. His logic was sound and his positions irrefutable. In conclusion Mr. Stevens quoted some obsolete speeches made by Carlisle, Ingersoll and others, speeches which the authors themselves have long since acknowledged to be based upon false premises and therefore false in conclusion. Mr. Stevens is hard to answer because he scatters all over creation and devotes his entire time to making assertions innumerable without proving any of them. But Mr. Handley gathered up what he could of Mr. Stevens' wild assertions and gave them all the answers that they deserved, but there wasn't enough in them to call forth much interest or enthusiasm.

Sismark continues hostile to America. He says we are wrong and insincere.  
Gladstone died at five o'clock this morning.
