To hand the State over to this trinity would mean rank ruin, and to send to the United States Senate from the State of Oregon, a man from this trinity of hungry political heretics would be a shame. To avoid such a calamity the only thing to do will be to elect the republican candidate for Joint Representative, Hon. J. W. Maxwell.
