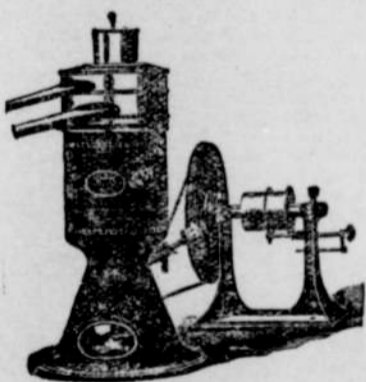

### A Dastardly Outrage.

An outrage that should be punished severely, occurred at the S. D. A. Church where the united Brethren are holding meetings on Tuesday evening. For about a week past the meetings have been much disturbed by a gang of thoughtless or vicious boys; but, on Tuesday evening the boys carried matters so far that some of them may be landed in jail, or, perhaps, worse. On the evening in question Mr. Freeman had driven into town with his family and his team was hitched near the church. During the services as some miscreant or miscreants took off one hind wheel of the wagon and one front wheel and changed them. The nuts were replaced but not fully screwed on. The wrench was then thrown away. Then as a fitting climax to their cussedness the boys poured some kind of acid on the backs of the horses. The whole thing seems to have been planned with the idea of causing the horses to run away, smash things up generally, and perhaps kill or maim some of the members of the family. The HEADLIGHT has no idea of the identity of the fellows who perpetrated the deed but no matter who they were it was a dastardly affair. As a result of the outrage Mr. Freeman will probably lose one of his horses—the best one on the ranch. The family had a narrow escape from a serious accident. We hope the offenders will be found out and punished as they deserve.

## Latest War News.

WEDNESDAY

In Sunday's fight at Guantanamo 2 Americans were killed and 4 wounded.

The Porto Rican expedition is off at last. It consisted of 16000 troops conveyed by a number of warships.

Oregon must make up her quota of men under the new call. 350 men will be needed from this state. The new recruits will go to the 2d regiment.

Orders have been received at Chicamauga to forward 15 regiments to the front.

At Havana Blanco tried to lure our warships within range of his guns but failed. The Montgomery responded to Blanco's intended treachery by opening fire on Punta Gorda with result not at all satisfactory to the Spaniards.

All the men in Lieut. Holson's crew have been promoted.

The Spaniards still continue to fight at Guantanamo. The hills are full of Guerrillas. The marines who have landed there, are anxiously awaiting the troops.

It is said that neither Dewey at Manila nor Sampson at Santiago have full control of the cables. All messages have to go through French offices enroute and hence much may be suppressed.

### THURSDAY NOON

The marines attacked the Spanish camp yesterday about 5 miles away from the American camp near Santiago and killed 40 Spaniards, and wounding many more. 2 Cubans were killed and 4 Cubans and 2 Americans wounded.

A battle occurred between the American forces near Guantanamo and the Spaniards. 100 Spaniards were killed and 18 prisoners taken. There were no casualties on the American side.

Sooriffes and a large amount of ammunition and provisions for the insurgents were landed near Santiago yesterday.
