Terrific Magazine Gun to Exterminate Men Rapidly.

The American army rifle, the Krag-Jorgensen, is one of the most destructive weapons ever made. When the bullet leaves its muzzle it has a velocity of a mile in two seconds, and is hurled with a force of about 18 tons to the square inch. The bullet is a long, pencil-shaped affair, and at the distance of four miles has power enough left to pierce a man's body. At a distance of 100 yards it will pass through the bodies of seven men in the line of fire, and will still be able to do great damage beyond them. A regiment of American infantry of 700 men, armed with the Krag-Jorgensen rifle, supported by a six-gun battery of breech-loading light cannon and a company of Gatling guns, were opposed to a force of Spaniards of 1500 men at 3000 yards. This would probably be the result: After one minute's firing at least 1000 of the Spaniards would be down. In 60 seconds their ranks would be swept by 26,000 flying shot, consisting of 14,000 bullets from the rifles, 10,800 shrapnel from the cannons and 2000 from the Gatlings. No force could exist in the face of such destruction. Inside of two minutes there would be hardly a man left to tell the tale. Ever since the battle in Manila by Spain may be said to have ships to burn.

Fleets Etc.

The terms fleet, H. line, and squadron seem to be regarded as identical by the average layman. A fleet is composed of twelve battleships. A mosquito fleet is composed of twelve or more small boats. A squadron is composed of less than twelve battleships, and is often a part of a fleet, such as the van, centre, or rear squadron.

A flotilla is composed of twelve or more men-of-war, some of which may be battleships. Hence the United States has no fleet; neither has Spain. Admiral Dewey commands a squadron. Almirante Montojo also commands a squadron. Acting Admiral Sampson commands a flotilla. Almirante Cervera and Almirante Camara each command a squadron.
