War News . . .

On Thursday last General Toral, Span-
ish commander at Santiago surrendered
that city to General Shafter, of the
American forces, on condition that the
Spanish soldiers, at Santiago numbering
about 25,000, be sent at our expense
back to Spain.—Terms were accepted and
the Spanish laid down their arms and
"Old Glory" was hoisted above Santiago
on July 17. The Spanish troops will be
sent back as soon as preparations can be
made and it is hoped to be able to start
by July 30th. The surrendering of San-
tiago guarded by 25,000 troops to 10,000
Americans saved much blood shed and
destruction of property. Admiral Samp-
son's last bombardment of the city
wrecked 57 houses.

Yellow fever is spreading among our
troops but not so bad as was reported,
there are less than 300 cases of it, and
every thing possible is being done to
prevent it from spreading farther.

Some troops with four batteries of
artillery sailed on the 19th for Porto Rico,
the next place to be attacked, and
20,000 more troops will follow them in a
few days. These go without a convoy as
there is no danger from the Spanish
fleet.

General Shafter will remain for the
present at Santiago and as soon as
his troops are rested, will perhaps
push on into Cuba and may march to
Havana.

All of the mines in Santiago harbor
entrance have been exploded so that our
fleet can go in and out without any
danger.

Commodore Watson's fleet is expect-
ed to sail any day for the coast of Spain.
His list of vessels is not fully made up
yet, but it is expected he will take the
Oregon as his flag ship. She is now
styled "The Queen of the Navy." In
talking with some of the Captive officers
of Cervara's fleet they said:—

"We expected to get away with three
of our ships. We thought the Oregon
had left and knew that the other bat-
tleships could not keep up with us.
We calculated to close in on the Brooklyn
and sink her, but we made a mistake
about the Oregon. If it had not been
for her, you would never have gotten us
all. I would like to meet your captain."

At Manila affairs are not much chan-
ged. Angulino, commander of Spanish
troops there refuse to surrender the city.
The 2nd expedition of our troops are
expected there daily and operations may
be deferred until the arrival of the last
detachment, early in August or even till
the cool weather in September. It is
expected by that time that bloodshed
will be unnecessary.

Geo. B. Lamb, accompanied by Prof. R.
C. French visited the Nehalem and Bay
City schools last week. They report
most of the schools closed for vacation,
but those now open are in very good
order and comfortably furnished.

Mrs. J. E. Tuttle and children spent
several days the first part of the week
at the beach at McMillans. While she
was away Mr. Tuttle made the carpenter
tools, paper hanging tools, and the paint
brush by in order to surprise her on her
return home. As a result his building is
neatly papered and painted on the in-
side and has a red, white and blue coat
outside.

Dr. R. H. Hovey, dentist, will remain
in town the rest of this month and can
be found at the Allen house. For refer-
ence he gives names of Senator Hains,
A. R. Leabo, Geo. L. Smith, C. B.
Stokes and Grant Hughes all of Forest
Grove.

Last Wednesday word came over the
wire to J. E. Tuttle, county coroner, that
G. T. Hollister, while fishing in a boat
near the mouth of the Nehalem river,
found the dead body of a man floating
in the water. He at once caught the
body, but in attempting to tow it ashore
his own back broke and he had to let the
body go to save himself. Every effort was
made immediately to find the corpse a
second time but even at low tide they
were unable to do so. The man was
dressed in heavy clothing with a dark
brown flannel shirt on. On arm was
gone and one side of his face was badly
eaten away. He apparently was about
35 years of age and it is thought to be
the body of a fisherman drowned in the
Columbia river.
