

Punishable Offenses

The following is a list of offenses which are punishable by law, as furnished by Deputy Dist. Attorney, C. U. Nolan. In most of the cases one-half of the fine goes to the person who informs:

- Assault with a dangerous weapon—Assault not being armed with a dangerous weapon—Child stealing—For burning buildings—For malicious burning lumber or vegetable products—For driving domestic animals from their range—Obtaining goods or writing by false pretenses—For malicious or wantonly injuring animals or any other personal property—For maliciously breaking dams etc.—For destroying boom or wharf—For destroying any road or telegraph post or wires—For setting fire to timber or on the prairie grass—For injuring fruit trees, fences, breaking or defacing any building—For opening gates or bars or leaving the same open on lands not under his control, or for taking from the land of another any growing produce—For trespassing on land not his own—For driving over public bridges faster than a walk or driving more than twenty five head of horses or cattle over a bridge at a time—For perjury and subornation of perjury—For endeavoring to procure or incite another to commit the crime of perjury—For bribing or offering to bribe any judicial legislative or executive officer—For officer refusing or delaying to serve process—For cruelly beating or torturing any animal—For disturbing religious meeting—For disturbing any public meeting—For keeping open any store, shop, grocery, bowling alley, billiard room or tipping house for the purposes of labor or traffic or any place of amusement on Sunday—For allowing obscene language before ladies—For disposing of liquor in any way on election day—For giving liquors to minors—For killing deer out of season—For buying, selling etc. of deer out of season—For unlawfully killing and selling elk out of season—For unlawfully taking of trout—For unlawfully killing ducks, swans and other birds out of season—For catching certain birds and fowls with traps etc. or destroying their nests—For making or having a barbed wire fence without having a board or pale on the top—For throwing dead fish and the like in any of the rivers and waters of this state—For using in any of the streams or rivers of this state any drugs, charms or powder, or to use any giant blasting or gun powder or other explosive material for the purpose of catching, killing, or destroying fish—For obstructing navigation of fish in streams—For cutting off more than one half of the ear of any domestic animal—For carrying concealed weapons—For wrongfully wearing Grand Army badges—For obstructing roads—For falsely assuming to be a magistrate or peace officer—For bribing or offering to bribe any voter of this state—For riding on driving on side walks or riding or driving in the street of an incorporated town faster than six miles an hour or using any obscene or profane language in any public place to the disturbance or annoyance of any person or persons—For throwing ballast into navigable streams—For destroying, injuring or mooring to buoys—For tearing down posted notices—For defacing inscription on corner of bearing tree—For selling unwholesome provisions—For adulterating provisions—For adulterating drugs—For polluting water used for domestic purposes—For putting logs and brush in the rivers or place them on the bank of rivers in such a manner as to allow them to wash in the river—For allowing any dead animal to ly within one half of a mile of any county road without being buried—For shooting on county road—For shooting a gun on the lakes or banks of lakes to kill ducks one hour after sun set and one half hour before sun rise.
