The steamer "Harrison" came in on Saturday with freight for P. Tohl, Mick Drosloff and Hempel & Wheeler. She left again the same day.

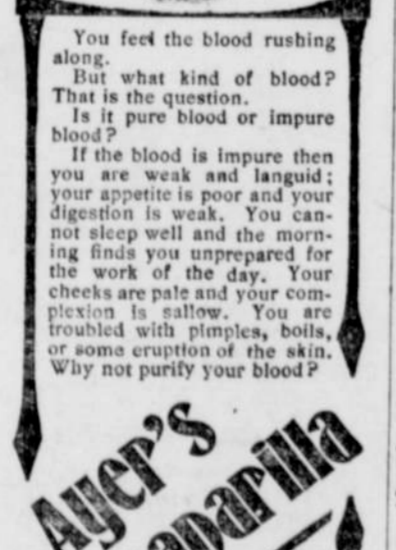
The bridge between Saginaw and the South Fork is still unrepair and impassable. Whose fault is this? the supervisor's or the commission's?
