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Anglo-Russian Relations Strained.

The relations between England and Russia are becoming decidedly strained and war between the two countries is not at all improbable.

The trouble is about a contract which the Chinese Government was about to sign with the Hongkong and Shanghai Bank for a loan with which to extend a railway to New Chung, secured on the railway itself.

M. Pavloff, having peremptorily forbidden the hypothecation of the railway, and thus made the loan impossible, the British Minister, Sir Claude MacDonald, under instructions caecded by Lord Salisbury, on the 22d of July informed the Yamen that England would "not tolerate any interference of another power as between her majesty's subjects and Chinese Government contracts, freely entered into with them by the latter, and would support the Chinese Government in resisting such aggression."

The next day the Russian Minister repeated with added emphasis his demands, and so the matter stands, pending the decision of China as to which power she will cast her lot with.

And, so the matter stands. One or the other of the powers must back down squarely or a conflict is inevitable. Ever since the Crimean war there has been bad blood between the two countries and Russia has never let an opportunity pass to humiliate and worst his enemy. England, for the sake of peace has submitted to Russian encroachment until forbearance has well nigh ceased to be a virtue. England as well as Russia is greedy for territory and power but there is this difference: England is a humane and christian country and wherever she goes she carries blessings with her, while Russia is a semi-barbarous country and leaves a conquered province in worse condition than she finds it.

If such a conflict should come America would doubtless remain neutral, but her sympathies would be with England.

Alas for the fruits of fame! We wonder if Lieut. Hobson would so bravely have entered Santiago harbor, could he have foreseen the day to come. Would he have found courage to be so brave, if he had known that the time had come when he could not so much as "change his shirt" without each town and hamlet of the great United States becoming egizant of the fact? Would he have dared to be a hero, could he have known that it would be necessary for him in future to spend his time in denying matrimonial engagements? We think not. And the worst of it is, it has just begun. The Lieutenant is still a young man. Perhaps it would have been better had he gone down in the Merrimac. Then he would have lived in history and escaped the everlasting handshakings and hatliftings and matrimonial engagements to which, as it is, he is doomed.—The Pathfinder.
