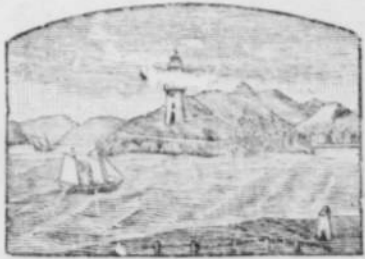

the court house.

Judge Boise, Ex-Gov. Thayer, H. St
Laynor Mr. Stapleton, and Prosecuting
Attorney, Samuel L. Hayden.

Deputy Sheriff's are in great de-

mand, but they must be good horseback
riders, able to ride one horse 100 miles,
walk 25 miles, catch 3 or 4 witnesses on
the run, ride back home the 100 miles,
do all this, without stopping, in 24
hours, and without a bite to eat; he
must also be able to sleep with one eye
at a time; unless he can do this, there is
no need of applying to the sheriff for a
job, if what the deputies, now acting,
say is true.

court house. They slide into the court
room very carefully and take a seat in
the least conspicuous place possible.

Soon jurors are needed and the sheriff
begins to look the audience over for
men to fill the vacancies, and the mer-
