What We Have Gained by the War.

1st.—The island of Porto Rico and other West India islands. 2nd.—A stable government for the island of Cuba and probably the island itself, insuring protection for our vast Cuban commerce and for our Cuban interests.

3rd.—A portion if not the whole of the Philippine islands. And aside from this territorial acquisition we have gained:

A deeper national feeling, a more profound and exalted patriotism, we have forgotten political party, class distinction and personal interest and remembered only that we are Americans, citizens of one common glorious country.

All remaining bitterness between the north and the south has been obliterated and the gallant men who once fought under the stars and bars have, under the stars and stripes, demonstrated the fact that in love for their country and willingness to die, if need be, for its honor and well being, they are not one whit behind the men of the north.

The feeling of hostility toward England which prevailed, especially in the north, has been allayed and Americans have become convinced that Great Britain, amongst all the nations of Europe, is their one unflinching friend.

many and France to observe a neutrality which they did not feel and which was evidently involuntary and ungracious.

It has given us a proud position in history and amongst the nations of the earth. Our victories, both on sea and land, and especially our naval victories are unparalleled in the history of the world.
