The Manufacturer makes the suggestion, the war being over and it being im. possible to utilize all war revenues, that the government should now set about in earnest the building of the Nicaragua canal, so imperatively needed by the industry and commerce of this country. "We are in carnest," the Manufacturer says "the greatest the world has ever seen, with England, Germany and France for the introduction and sale of the products of American industry."

The ultimate winning in the international struggle for the world's markets, a struggle that is all ready fierce and growing stronger, must go to the nation which makes the quickest application of the best intelligence. In this struggle England has already fallen back with the loss of Eastern markets, where formerly her sway was almost malisputed. and with the invasion of their home markets. Germany has advanced with amazing strides because she has trained thousands of men to discover new and cheaper ways of making old products. The United States has developed by the sheer force of the genius and the superior altertness and quickness of her people but the United States, save for the tarriff, which has developed her manufactures and places them out of the reach of her commercial rivals, has adopted no national policy for the extention of her trade. The retention of the Philippines and the building of the Nicaragua canal would give the United States such an advantage of the East as no European rival could overcome. The wealth of the East, instead of pouring into Lon don, would be divided with this country and there would ensue an increase of population so enormous and of national power so great that the United States would far excel in world influence any existing nation. The situation and opp rtunity call either for statesmanship of highest order or for a general movement of the people based on knowledge of the destiny that may be ours.

Facts About Money.

If the parity of the two metals can not be maintained, a silver basis would be inevitable.

Legislation cannot make a fixed standard of value between two metals where their production is not also fixed

by legislation. Gold coin is the measure of value adopted by the leading nations of the world in which all obligations are finally redeemable.

In order to maintain the ratio of 16 to 1, 16 ounces of silver must be equal to 1 ounce of gold in value.

Whenever a silver dollar cannot be made exchangable with a gold dollar, depreciation and repudiation will begin. More silver has been forced into the currency by fiftyfold since 1873 than there was for 80 years prior to that date. The commercial ratio of actual value at which gold and silver can be exchanged is at present 31 ounces of silver

to 1 of gold. Sound money and sound morals are synonymous terms. To pay a dollar's debt with a dollar worth 99 cents is re-

pudiation to the extent of 1 cent. Mexican dollars have a larger amount of silver than dollars of the United States, yet an Ataerican silver dollar, backed by a gold standard, can buy two

If it were possible for the United Mexican dollars. States to maintain the parity of silver with gold for teu years, the increased profits of the silver mine owners would amount to more than the entire national

Contracts are often made payable in debt. gold. Why are none made payable in silver? Simply because neither party prefers silver. There is no law against such contracts, but silver is generally considered an unstable measure of value and therefore unfitted for this purpose

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
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
