High Water Mark.

From accounts in all the valley
papers we see real prosperity has come
once more to all our neighbors on the
other side of the woods. Farmers are
getting splendid crops in grain, hops
and prunes. Everything around their
farms is in a bustle. Good crops, good
prices. All this means much to the
farmer, but with all their prosperity
they are no better off than many of our
dairy men. We read nothing of wonder-
ful crops of milk, because they do not
have them.

There are thousands of pounds of
butter and cheese shipped from our
county each year which means thou-
sands of dollars to be divided among our
dairy men.

In the month of July the Tillamook
Dairy Association, which has its creamery
at Fairview made more butter than for
any single month during its run, now
several years old. They turned out
nearly 22,000 of the best of butter for
that month, which brought into the
county \$3500 to be distributed among
its many patrons. This creamery is not
the only one in the county. They are
to be found at Nehalem, at the southern
end of the county and in between these
points they are scattered along every-
where.

If good crops to farmers elsewhere
mean prosperity surely good cows and a
good price for butter means prosperity
for us. Truly our dairy men are holding
their own with the grain producers of
the world.

True Democratic Doctrine.

Jefferson, in 1783, wrote: "Just
principles will lead us to disregard legal
proportion altogether, to inquire into
the market price of gold in the several
countries with which we shall princi-
pally be connected in commerce and to
take an average from them. I very
much doubt a right now to change the
value, and especially to lessen it."

The house committee, in 1821, re-
ported: "It is sufficient to know, by un-
happy experience, that its ratio of 15
to 11 tendency is to rid us of a gold cur-
rency and leave us nothing but silver."
The house committee, in 1834, re-
ported: "The desideratum in the monetary
system is a standard of uniform value.
We cannot ascertain that both metals
have ever circulated simultaneously,
concurrently and indiscriminately in
any country where there are banks or
money dealers, and we entertain the
conviction that the nearest approach to
an invariable standard is its establish-
ment in one metal, which metal shall
compose exclusively the currency for
large payments."

Andrew Jackson, in 1826, wrote:
"There is no fraud in gold. It is un-
changeable and will do its office every-
where and at all times. Labor imparts
an invariable value to it."
Benton, in 1834, said in debate: "It
[gold] has an intrinsic value, which
gives it currency all over the world to
the full amount of that value without
regard to law or circumstances. It has
a uniformity of value which makes it
the safest standard of value of property
which the wisdom of man has yet dis-
covered. Its superiority over all other
money gives to its possessor the choice
and command of all other money."

Following this debate the act called
the "administration gold bill," in-
tended to put the country on a single
gold standard, was passed, 145 to 86 in
the house and 35 to 7 in the senate, and
signed by Andrew Jackson, president.
The house committee, in 1853, re-
ported: "Gold is the only standard of value
by which all property is now measured.
It is virtually the only currency of the
country. We desire to have the standard
currency to consist of gold only, and
that these silver coins shall be entirely
subservient to it, and that they shall be
used rather as tokens than as standard
coins."

Astor's Taxes.

John Jacob Astor, who not only went
into the army but enlisted troops,
equipped artillery and offered to provide
the government a battle-ship, has now
broken the record by asking a revision
of the assessment of his taxable property.
Many tax payers protest against the
assessor's valuation, but it is a rare case
where a man objects that he is paying
too little taxes. Astor says that he
thinks that he is not paying his full
share of the expenses of government,
and he proposes to have his own agents
revise the official assessment, on an
equitable basis.
