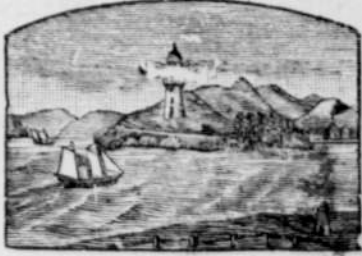

carrying lumber and freight. There is a
strong possibility that he will carry freight
over the field. The Dewey is a 500 ton
3 masted schooner and draws from 6
to 8 feet of water. The Maggie is
smaller, being only a 100 ton vessel,
but has been greatly repaired the past
summer having had a double deck put
on her. Capt. Crim who is running
the vessels will be in town soon and if
the venture will justify them they will
make regular trips to Tillamook.

There has been considerable trouble
about the boat "Miami" ever since it
was built, and now there seems to be a
little more. The Melaney Bros. had
the boat built at a great expense to their
creditors who hold a mortgage on it.
The boat was then leased to the Melaney
Bros. by the Tillamook Tug Company
until such a time when the Bros. could
buy it. They have been working hard all
summer, carrying freight up and down
the coast and just recently on arriving at
Astoria the Melaney Bros. took "French
leave" of the boat with their summer
earnings and have been heard from in
Mexico. The boat is now in Astoria
undergoing repairs and preparing for
another trip down the coast. The boat
has had several liens placed on her since
she arrived in port and it is not fully
known whether she will be able to get
to sea with them or not.

Lemons as Medicine.

Lemon juice sweetened with loaf or
crushed sugar will relieve a cough.

For feverishness and an unnatural
thirst soften a lemon by rolling on a hard
surface, cut off the top, add sugar and
work it down into the lemon with a
fork, then suck it slowly.

During the warm months a sense of
coolness, comfort and invigoration can
be produced by a free use of lemonade.
For six large glasses of lemonade use six
large, juicy lemons; roll on a hard sur-
face, so that the juice can be easily ex-
tracted. Peel and slice. Add sufficient
sugar to sweeten, and stir it well into the
juice before adding the water.

Hot lemonade will break up a cold if
taken at the start. Make it the same as
cold lemonade, only use boiling water in-
stead of cold water, and use about one-
half as much sugar.

A piece of lemon or stale bread moist-
ened with lemon juice, bound on a corn,
will cure it. Renew night and morn-
ing. The first application will produce
soreness, but if treatment is persisted in
for a reasonable length of time a cure
will be effected.

The discomfort caused by sore and ten-
der feet may be lessened, if not entirely
cured, by applying slices of lemon on the
feet.

To cure chilblains, take a piece of
lemon, sprinkle fine salt over it and rub
the feet well. Repeat, if necessary.

Lemon juice will relieve roughness and
vegetable stains on the hands. After
having the hands in hot soapsuds rub
them with a piece of lemon. This will
prevent chapping and make the hands
soft and white.—Ex.
