

THE PACIFIC COAST BENEFITED

The Pacific Coast States in a position to be benefited by the late war with Spain and the breaking up of the Chinese Empire by European Nations.

From the United States Investors Boston, Sept. 10.

No part of the country has so far benefited, and none will hereafter benefit, so greatly from the war through which we have just been passing as the West. The most obvious benefit is the crowding out of the old financial heresies which have plagued us so long. The interest aroused by the war and the possibilities which have been presented to us of territorial aggrandizement, have devalued the silver issue and all other propositions looking to paternalism. It is needless to say that the West is bound to gain much from this fact. Eastern and European capital needs the opportunity to forget the peculiar theories which the West has emulated in the past years, and this opportunity is now at hand. We anticipate, as a result, a rapid revival of confidence in trans-Missouri investments.

Great, however, as has already been the effect upon the West of the war, we have nevertheless seen but the beginning of good things. We have been accustomed to think of the East as the maritime section of the United States, and of the West as the agricultural and mining district. But there are unmistakable signs that the Pacific coast of the North American continent was designated as the greatest seat of commerce the world has ever yet contained. The future is, of course, a mystery, but if anything may be safely assumed, it is that the Pacific ocean is destined to become a magnificent highway of trade.

There never was a time when more astounding transformations in the secular affairs of this world were taking place than at present. We read of the diplomatic finessing of the European nations for position in China, but do we realize what that means? An empire containing a quarter of the earth's inhabitants is in the act of breaking up—an empire whose early history is lost in antiquity, but which, from certain knowledge, was in its prime centuries before Greece and Rome were factors in human affairs. Its civilization was of the highest order known to antiquity, and it has come down to the present day intact. For thousands of years China has pursued a policy of isolation, shut up, in herself, supremely contemptuous of the rest of mankind, slowly but surely verging upon that moribund condition which always in the end overtakes inaction. She is now beginning to go to pieces. Who can say that her dissolution will be attended with less extraordinary results than accompanied the passing of the Roman power? The Chinese empire is spoken of as a "derelict," but it is a derelict whose removal cannot be effected without the most momentous consequences.

Those consequences may be viewed from every standpoint—from that of religion or of art or of philosophy or of territorial aggrandizement or of trade. The last is the only one which can properly be discussed in this paper. The European nations are at work carving up the empire among themselves. This necessarily implies a revolution in the commerce of the world and a shifting of the trade center of this planet to a new locality. That locality is the Pacific ocean, whose western shore for a distance of 4000 miles is a part of the United States. A quarter of the earth's population is about to be converted from non consumers to consumers of Western products. That means a new lease of life to the industries of the United States and Europe.

The Pacific coast states of the United States are in the position most favored by nature for the development of trade with China. The war through which we have been passing has opened their eyes to this fact. It has done more. It has demonstrated to ourselves and to Europe that we are capable of looking out after our interests in the far East. It renders it certain that no step will be taken that will be effective in destroying our opportunities. Those opportunities we shall now proceed to improve. What the end will be we cannot pretend to predict. We have heard it said that San Francisco will become the greatest city in the world. That may seem an idle dream, but more astonishing things than that have come to pass. One thing we are sure of, and that is that our Pacific coast is bound to be the chief gainer from that most momentous event of recent many centuries—the break-up of the Chinese empire.
