

WEATHER REPORTS.

From Tillamook's Valuable Observer.

We are in receipt of the monthly and semi-annual reports of the weather conditions in Tillamook county. They are highly interesting, and our readers would do well to preserve them, for they are full of useful information.

A German, from Portland, representing a small colony, having received a copy of THE HEADLIGHT, with my monthly weather report published in it, he went to headquarters in Portland to see if it was an official report.

Captain Dawson is desirous of people offering a few remarks on the weather reports and his suggestions. Having had twelve months' experience as voluntary observer the editor of THE HEADLIGHT appreciates the efforts of the captain in keeping these reports, for they are up to date, and become valuable information, particularly as Tillamook county is reaching out for more settlers.
