In the matter of the boundaries of road districts, the court consolidated road districts Nos. 1 and 2 into district No. 1; Nos. 3 and 4 into district No. 2; Nos. 5 and 6, district No. 3. In regard to the appointment of these road districts, the court left that until its next session. Had the court not been so extended the court would, in all probability, have converted the whole county into one road district with but one road supervisor.

### RAILROAD GOSSIP.

Every few months railroad gossip predicts that Tillamook county is to have a railroad, and the latest is that the Seaside railroad is to be extended here. The Oregonian said one day last week:

"The practicability of building a railroad down the Oregon coast from Seaside has been discussed, but the country forming the watershed between the Necanicum and the Nehalem rivers is very much broken, and it has been supposed to be impassable for a railroad. Lately two prospectors, A. Bergsvick and O. Ohlson, making a pretty thorough examination of the country, discovered a practicable pass between the two valleys, and they report that a railroad may be built there at small cost. This is the route outlined:

"Starting from Seaside station, the present southern terminus of the coast road, the Necanicum valley would afford an easy grade for 17 miles. Then the rough country would be encountered, of which little is known, because it has been visited chiefly by hunters, who stray in there once in a great while, but soon get out, because it is neither easy or profitable to hunt there. However, these prospectors discovered that one branch of the Necanicum and one branch of the Nehalem have a common source, the two creeks being only a few hundred feet apart, and that at one place the summit is merely a low bank between the streams. No attempt has been made to calculate the height of the pass, but the discoverers declare their belief that it is the lowest crossing between the two valleys, and that it is not only a practicable route for a railroad, but an inexpensive one.

"It is likely that steps will be taken to get accurate data regarding the newly found pass, with a view of locating a railroad through it to a rich coast country to the southward."

### THE REAL OBSTRUCTION

And the Reasons Why Improvements are Not Made.

TO THE EDITOR OF TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT

SIR,—I noticed in your issue of the 22nd of Dec. 1898, an article headed "A Jetty Wanted," and signed by Claude Thayer. As he asks some pertinent questions in relation to the improvement of the mouth and bar of Tillamook bay, I, being in possession of many facts relating to that improvement, I beg leave to answer some of his questions in your paper, as also to offer some reasons why those improvements have not been done. About 10 years ago the writer of this article did draw up a petition to the legislature of Oregon, for them to memorialize the Congress of the United States, to have our harbor and bar surveyed so that an estimate of the cost of the improvements might be made and chartered and insured ships might come into the bay. That business was all done and transacted through to the halls of Congress. Has Mr. Thayer forgotten that he signed that petition? Has he forgotten what transpired at the town of Lincoln when our Honorable U. S. Representative sent to that classic town to know what was wanted to be done? Does he forget the reply made to that letter by Logan Storey? Of a surity it was not the improvements of the lower bay and its bar, "but the sloughs and rivers above tide water," that was the reply sent back, and there the building of jetties has been done, reversing the ancient doctrine of "making the highways straight" till we have not got a straight deep channel in the upper part of the bay anymore, and all the money appropriated to make those channels crooked has not improved the bay for deep water commerce one jot, but has stagnated it. In the month of February, 1896, I drafted a petition to the U. S. Congress to have our bar and harbor surveyed in order to make an estimate of the cost of removing the obstructions in the bay known as the sow and pigs, as also the removal of the bar of the bay. It went to congress and our Hon. U. S. Representative put the petition into the form of a bill known as H. R. 6887. It passed the house, and the survey was ordered done. The survey was made by Captain Fisk. Mr. Thayer, doth thou, in all thy great wisdom, pretend not to know why that improvement is not being done when it has been known many years by the people who live near the bay and who read the Engineer's report on the improvements of our harbor?

Who is the cause of so much stagnation in commerce? It appears to lay it to the members of Congress. I say no, sir; for the "Boycott" has been put upon us by the U. S. Engineers sent here to examine our harbor and bar, and make estimates for improving them, and what report have they made to congress? "Tillamook bay is worthy of improvement, but the commerce of the port does not guarantee the expenditure," and for what reason rumor says railroads magnates, and a certain commercial institution in Portland have monkeyed with the engineers to make such reports to keep overland railroads and deep water ships from having a port and

terminus in our bay for inland commerce. Also the local jealousy existing with some persons in Tillamook City against the town on the bay, a jealousy that should not exist, as there is no profit in it. Have you not heard that "Maxwell tones are Bonnie," then if you propose to be generous and wish to see our harbor whitened with the sails of deep sea going ships do thou prepare thy plea, start thy couriers around to get it beautifully signed and let our Veteran Representative Maxwell have it to take to the Oregon legislature to pray them to memorialize the Congress of the U. S. to have the obstructions removed from the mouth and bar of the harbor of Tillamook bay that largeships can come into the Port of Tillamook and be loaded with the commercial commodities of the port; that the Boycott report put upon our port may be no more heard in the land, nor in the halls of Congress by our 17th of October, reached Honorable the railroad company's Senators; "That Tillamook bay is worthy of improvement, but the commerce of the bay does not guarantee the expenditure to do it."
