GOSSIP ABOUT NOTED PEOPLE

A friend of Andrew Carnegie says that the latter has given altogether \$6,174,500 for the establishment of twenty-four libraries or institutes in this country or Scotland, and his conditional offers now outstanding, all of which will be accepted, will take \$2,000,000 more from his purse. The list of gifts shows that \$5,100,000 was expended in founding the institutes and libraries at Pittsburg, Allegheny, Braddock, Homestead, Duquesne and Johnstown, the cities or towns in Pennsylvania where his employes live.

Dr. Cabell Whitehead, at present assayer of the United States mint, has accepted from the Turkish government a position which will virtually make him director general of industries in the sultan's domain. It is intended to introduce into Turkey American methods and machinery in some great manufacturing establishments now under way in Constantinople. The general management of these will form part of Dr. Whitehead's duties.

A friend of Speaker Reed sent him a clipping from a Los Angeles newspaper of the speech made there by General Shafter, in which the general severely criticised Mr. Reed for his attitude towards and lack of sympathy with the administration. The Maine statesman, mindful, doubtless, of the army regulation, which makes it a very grave offense for an officer to criticise a member of the government, and thinking evidently of General Eagan's great luck, wrote in reply thanking his friend and saying: "I suppose General Shafter was looking for a furlough on full pay."

G. W. Dunn, the naturalist, who has made twelve collecting trips to South America, intends soon to go to the Philippine islands to collect for the Rothschilds. He is an authority on the flora of California, and represented that state at the native plant exhibit at the World's fair. The projected trip to the Philippines is remarkable on account of Mr. Dunn's age, which is eighty-five years. He, however, shows none of the infirmities of old age. His eye and brain are clear, his nerves steady and his activity that of a much younger man. His memory is remarkably good, as is shown in the facility with which he arranges the details of his scientific researches.

Senator Allison is credited with doing a smart trick in aid of the \$20,000,000 appropriation to Spain. He learned that Vest and some other democratic senator meant to delay the bill, and so had it brought up while the Missourian was absent. Just as the vice president was reading it a third time Senator Vest entered.
