The incorporators are Robert Watt, Frank Long and J. W. McKinley and the place of business is Bay City.

The city dads on Monday evening did right in tabeling the ordinance giving the druggists permission to sell spirituous and malt liquors for medicinal and mechanical purposes. The druggists of this city should have the same rights and privileges as druggists in every other city in this state—no more or no less. The ordinance passed some years ago prohibiting them from selling for medicinal purposes perhaps was all right at the time, when it was known druggists were abusing their rights. We think the best way for

the council to dispose of the matter is to repeal this ordinance and allow the druggists the same privileges as those in other cities, so in that case no one could accuse the council of legislating in favor of one class more than another. It is perfectly right that the saloon keepers should be protected, for they are heavily taxed by the city, and should enjoy the same privileges as saloons in other towns—no more or no less.

Mirror Reflecting Local Opinion.

The article in last week's HEADLIGHT on "A Smutty Preacher" was only a mirror reflecting local opinion, so the editor do not claim to be the first citizen who had the courage and conviction to denounce what was considered improper language. Road to Clatsop Wanted.

The following letter was written to Mr. A. B. Hammond by the Port of Tillamook Commission:

"The Port of Tillamook Commission, in its capacity of quasi-Board of Trade, would respectfully urge upon you the importance of direct connection being established between this county and Astoria. The absence of snow would render such connection feasible during the whole year. It is conceived that Tillamook county might guarantee a road to Nehalem which would be passable all the year round at a rate of speed of ten miles per hour by stage or light drivers. The Commission would suggest to you the establishment of a road which would in the near future serve as your railroad bed. During the interim the Tillamook trade will be a direct feeder to your Astoria railroad."

The Commission has also asked the assistance of the Astoria Push Club.

Cloutrie's Body Found.

ASTORIA, April 29.—The party that went out in search of the body of A. J. Cloutrie returned to Seaside late this afternoon and reported having found it about a mile and a half in the back trail from where the bodies of Radir and Heikmann were found. Cloutrie was evidently the first of the party to die, as his body had been dragged down the side of a hill for over 100 yards and placed under a log in a sheltered place. The body was well preserved. It will be brought into Seaside tomorrow. Near where Cloutrie died there was evidence that the three other men were at that time in good health from the way they walked about. There were signs of their having eaten raw domestic onions, and the skins of cooked meat sausages were found on the ground. It is believed now that the sausages were the cause of death, but this is only the latest of many theories. It is evident that the men could not have been very sick when Cloutrie died or they would not have been so careful to lay his body away in a sheltered and out-of-the-way place. Their camp has not been discovered, but the party that goes out from Seaside tomorrow morning will keep up the search until it is found.

TO THE EDITOR TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT.

DEAR SIR:—The connection of the name of Antoine J. Cloutrie—familiarly known as "Chucky"—with suggestions of foul play in the case of the mysterious deaths of the Necanicum timber cruisers, cannot be read but with resentment by those acquainted with him, for he was a man of the kindest nature.

A French Canadian by birth, most of his life has been spent in Oregon, principally on Clatsop plains, where he raised and educated an eminently respectable family; three married daughters survive him, one of whom is the wife of Mr. Mason, of the firm of Seely & Mason of Portland. Chucky was as well known to the old settlers of Northern Tillamook as to those of Clatsop; as he used to carry the weekly mail from Seaside to Tillamook, when there was not even a trail north of Tillamook city. It was either coast around the bay or take the water. He had all the hardihood, Woodcraft, and bon homme of the old time Canadian voyager, with the open door hospitality of the sunny south; and to have Chucky in a camp meant all the comfort, etc., that the circumstances permitted.

But he had grown old, being about 65 years of age, and should not have gone on the trip which has ended so mysteriously and disastrously for himself and companions.
