NEHALEM LUMBER. Michigan Firm Will Build a Mill to Saw It.

James H. Griffin, timber cruiser in the employ of the Snell Lumber Company, of Au Sable, Mich., has recently returned from a tour of inspection in the Nehalem woods, where the company has purchased a number of claims on which some 50,000,000 feet of timber are supposed to be standing in the tree.

There is no harbor for deep-water vessels at the mouth of the Nehalem, but ships can be loaded in fair weather by means of lighters, while lumber barges may be towed in and out by tugs at all seasons.

BANK circulation continues to decline. According to figures furnished from the office of the comptroller of the currency, the net loss since the beginning of the present month in bond-secured circulation based upon United States bonds has declined from \$214,000,000 on January 1, 1899, to \$206,000,000.

It is stated that the new 3 per cent bonds have not proved a potent factor in increasing circulation, but it is not unlikely that they have arrested its decline. They are not proving a permanent basis of circulation. A good many banks which deposited them soon after they were issued are now withdrawing them from the custody of the treasury and retiring the circulation of which they were the basis.

There is some dissatisfaction in the Grand Army of the Republic with the administration of the Pension bureau. Recently the New York state encampment adopted a resolution expressing its disapproval of the way in which the bureau is administered and calling for the removal of the commissioner, Hon. H. Clay Evans.

THE fact is that Commissioner Evans has made a good many enemies among the pension attorneys and claim agents and it is probable that these are largely instrumental in stirring up dissatisfaction among Grand Army members.
