School Supt. G. B. Lamb has arranged to hold a teachers' institute in this city on Saturday, July 16, at ten a.m., in the school building. As these local institutes are of much interest to teachers and patrons of schools, it is hoped that the meeting will be well attended.

McIntosh & McNair have purchased a lot on the north side of the post office, and will put up a building there, connecting with their present store at the back, thus giving them a frontage on two streets. They will use the new building for farm implements, etc.

The city council met on Monday evening with Councilmen C. E. Hawke, L. Olsen, L. Hiner and A. J. Cohn present. The city treasurer's report was approved. Bills were presented and allowed as follows: Nels Thompson, for salary of treasurer for six months, \$12.50; ditto, stationery, 40c.; recorder's salary, \$10; marshal's salary, \$30; ditto, arrests, \$4; work on streets, \$15; water rent, \$40. George Higgenbotham and A. Ford were appointed special policemen for the Fourth. The draft for an ordinance to prohibit the use of swearing and using obscene language on the streets was taken up for third reading, and upon the question being asked shall the ordinance pass, Councilman Cohn opposed it, and after a long and tiresome discussion the draft of ordinance was rejected and a motion made and carried that the city attorney be instructed to draft a new ordinance. Mr. T. B. Handley presented a bill for a judgment against the city rendered in the circuit court in favor of C. B. Handley for \$24.50, and upon motion it was laid over until the next meeting, with an order that the city attorney report to the council on the same.

The selection of a principal for a public school is a delicate and most important part of the duties of the school directors, for it depends greatly upon their discretion and wisdom what kind of a school will follow. This duty now devolves upon the directors of this district. We do not think it is to the best interest of Tillamook school for the directors to be changing principals every year, and for that reason we would advise the directors to take this matter into their consideration, so that in choosing a principal it may be with the view of keeping the person in that position. Not only so, but to loyally support the principal in the discipline of the school. We are sorry to see a lack of interest by the patrons of this district in the public school, for when this exists there is a tendency to complain at the principal or teachers at some trivial thing which is not deserving of a moment's consideration. We do not know the names of the applicants the directors will have before them on Saturday for the position, but we do say this for the best interest of the public school of this city we would like to see the salary raised, so that first class, up to date teachers, those who are making teaching a life profession, would think it worth while to apply for the position. Until this is done we do not anticipate seeing many of the higher branches of education introduced which, in a growing city like Tillamook, must soon become a necessity, even if that time is not already passed.

**The County's Business.**

The board of county commissioners convened Wednesday and Thursday, with Judge G. W. Sappington and Commissioners Ray and Wheeler present. Only a part of the proceedings is given below:

In the matter of the petition of L. Parrish for a change in the county road, the court ordered that T. P. Hobson, John Johnson and Christ Peterson be appointed viewers and A. M. Austin surveyor, to meet at the residence of L. Parrish on July 15th, at 8 a.m.

The court has ordered the collection of the delinquent bicycle tax.

In the matter of the claim of W. D. Stillwell for removing rack heap from north channel of Trask river, the court allowed \$50, and balance of account to be continued.

In the matter of the petition of W. W. Jacobs for a county road, the court rejected the petition upon the viewers' report.

In the matter of a petition to alter the county road leading from Sand Lake to Spruce, the court appointed Seth Moon, Hans Jensen and C. A. Smith viewers, to meet on August 7th.

In the matter of the petition of M. T. Chance for a county road, the court appointed Jonas Olsen, Tom Jenkins and Samuel Downs viewers, to meet at starting point on July 18.

In the matter of a right of way for a county road by E. Brown and others, the court ordered the clerk to draw warrant for \$50 to pay for the land.

In the matter of the petition of P. D. Newell to open and survey the Nehalem trail, Wm. Tohl, Ed. Lane and W. Armstrong were appointed viewers to meet August 21st.
