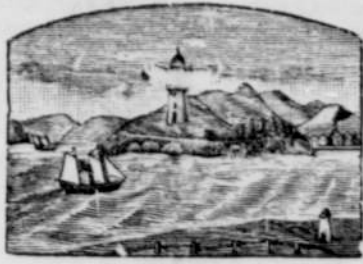

was not reappointed to this county.

Mr. O. B. Lawrence was in from Wood-
burn this week. He is the father of Pri-
vate Lawrence, of the Second Oregon
regiment, who, with two other soldiers,
turned up missing after going out on a
foraging expedition. Mr. Lawrence is of
the opinion that his son was murdered,
having but very little confidence in the
report that the three missing Oregon boys
were alive.

Is it not a little peculiar that solicitors
can come into this county with sewing
machines, organs and pianos and secure
exorbitant prices for them? We will
gamble that if any of the parties who
paid big figures for sewing machines the
past few weeks had gone to any one of
our merchants they would have saved
at least \$20 on the trade. Beside, these
solicitors don't help pay the taxes.

If the democrats succeed in inducing
Admiral Cogh, Dewey to run for president
they certainly will have a strong candi-
date. But it will not take the country
long to see that it is at present given too
much to hero worship. Hobson had his
day until a silly lot of women began hug-

the height of ridiculousness, pushing the
heroism of Hobson into the background.

It is reported from Washington that
Congressman Tongue will seek a place
on the rivers and harbors committee.
We do not know of a position where Mr.
Tongue could be of more service to Ore-
gon than on this committee. Speaking
locally, or for Tillamook county, we hope
the report will turn out an actual fact
and Mr. Tongue's aspirations will be
granted, for he is aware of the disadvan-
tages under which Tillamook, in the mat-
ter of transportation and the develop-
ment of the county, is handicapped. This
county will have a staunch friend at court
if Mr. Tongue is placed on the rivers and
harbors committee, who, with his usual
amount of persistence, can be relied upon
to get, if possible, substantial appropri-
ations for Tillamook's long neglected
bays, rivers, harbors and bars. It was
through Congressman Tongue's untiring
energy that this county received \$25,000
last year.

The activity in timberland entries in
the Oregon City land office is greater
than for some years—perhaps greater
than at any other time in the history
of such entries in the state. This may
perhaps be partially explained in the
proneness of human beings to tread
each other's heels in speculative lines.
It is probable, however, that it is largely
due to a general awakening to the
prospective value of our forest re-
sources, in view of the increased de-
mand for lumber for export. Such an
awakening will do more to protect our
forests from devastating fires and tim-
ber-thieves than an army of forest
rangers and federal detectives. The
man who files on a timber claim will
be pretty apt to see that it is not ren-
dered valueless by careless campers or
sneak-thieves. There is no other inter-
est that can compare with self-interest
when it comes to the protection of prop-
erty. The filing of forty timberland
claims on Wilson river, in Tillamook
county, one day last week, may be held,
therefore, to insure this region from
forest fires.—Oregonian.

The absurdity of building a railroad to
Portland from Astoria is more plainly
seen every day. At the present time the
railroad is engaged in a futile attempt to
buck the combination of steamboats on
the Columbia river, round trip tickets
being sold for one dollar, which enables
Astorian to go to Portland and trade,
but devil a bit of trading do Astoria get
from Portland in return. The fact is
Astorian are badly bit, not only in the
amount of business that city expected to
acquire by a railroad, but also in digging
their hands too far down into their jeans
to pay for the road being constructed,
for this is what the Astoria Herald said
last week, "The people of Astoria do not
have as exalted an opinion of Mr. A. B.
Hammond as when they were trying to
give him one-third of all their property
to build a railroad. For some reason,
the railroad has not produced the results
which some of them predicted." Let the
citizens of Tillamook take warning from
Astoria when it is proposed to construct
a railroad into this county and not go
plumb crazy raising money to subsidize
a company or an individual to do so. Let
those who want to build a railroad into
Tillamook construct it on business prin-
ciples, for the resources of Tillamook are
well able to support it. It is the opinion
of not only a number of our own citizens,
but a number of lumber men who have
taken in the situation, that most of the
lumber will be shipped out of the county
on a railroad.

We have received a letter from Mr. L.
Chevalley, whose address is 488 Irving
street, Portland, relating to starting a
condensed milk factory in this county,
which explains itself: "DEAR SIR,—For
the past three months I have done every-
thing in order to interest Portland capi-
talists in the condensed milk industry in
Tillamook county. I explained to them
that Tillamook county would be an ideal
place for a factory as far as the quality
and quantity of the milk for a condensed
milk factory were concerned. The whole-
sale houses of Portland sold last year
only 40,000 cases of condensed milk—with
and without sugar. That gave to the fac-
tories a profit of \$26,000. There are
two companies in Switzerland which ex-
port every day 3600 cases of sweet con-
densed milk to India, China and Japan.
It would be a very easy matter for a fac-
tory to find a ready market for 200 cases
daily right on the Pacific Coast that
would give a profit of \$120 per day. I
have manufactured here in Portland—
with poor milk and poor machinery—a
fine condensed milk, found by business
men to be superior to any condensed milk
of your county wrote me that
"If you could build a factory with nearly
nothing, we could soon build up a good
business." Do you know of any good
place for a cheese factory? If I could
find a party ready to guarantee 250,000
pounds of milk for the start I would fur-
nish the machinery. I will be very thank-
ful to you if you can do something for
me." Yes, undoubtedly, if good advice
is "something," we can. If Tillamook
dairymen had waited and depended upon
Portland capitalists to become interested
in the dairy business of this county it
might have waited till doomsday until
anything was done in that direction. It
is the individual efforts of the dairymen
which make Tillamook a dairy county,
of course, combined with favorable cli-
matic conditions, not the "interest" of
Portland capitalists. If our correspond-
ent is convinced that the manufacture of
condensed milk is a profitable industry
and suited to this county, there are plenty
of openings here where he can start in
on a small scale, and we believe the
dairymen would be glad to give him some
patronage for the purpose of getting it
established.
