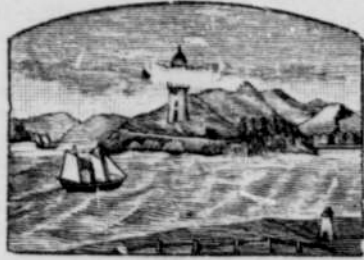

He must surely be a populist who has not a word to say when railroad corporations gobble up thousands of acres of timber lands and crowd out American citizens. Bah! Take the wool out of your eyes.
We hardly like to think what Prophet Dawson's predictions of the weather will be in Tillamook county on account of the most remarkable spectacular shower of shooting stars which will be seen in the heavens, it is predicted, on the night of the 14th inst. Those who kept their peepers open 33 years ago to witness what effect Leonidis' coming would have on the stary heavens hope that Prophet Dawson will keep the atmosphere clear of mist so that Tillamookers can behold this wonderful meteoric display.
There is a demand for improved farms in this county by people who want to settle here, but the trouble is there are so few improved farms for sale in Tillamook. This speaks well for the county, for those who have dairy farms—a large number of whom had the grit to clear ground covered with big stumps of trees—do not care to dispose of them for they know dairy farming in Tillamook is a profitable and safe investment. In regard to unimproved land—and there is plenty of that—those who want to sell should be willing to sell at reasonable figures, and not hold it too high.
When Mr. Reed was at Tillamook several weeks ago he inspected all the streams emptying into the bay with a view to selecting a site for a hatchery. On the day on which he was going out to make definite selection it rained so that he could not go, and he was forced to abandon the trip for that time, as he had to leave for home the next day. He thinks from what he has learned, however, that the Tillamook hatchery will be located on Wilson river, above tide water, perhaps as high as Walt Smith's place. Wilson is the largest of the five streams emptying into Tillamook bay, and carries a large volume of water.

It may be interesting to Tillamookers to know that the fare from this city to Astoria on the steamers belonging to the Pacific Navigation Company is likely to be raised. It will be remembered that Mr. Samuel Elmore came to Tillamook a few months since, and after his arduous labors feeding the fish while on the voyage round here he must have gone home convinced that it was worth more than \$3.50 for that privilege, and proposes adding \$1.50 to the fare, or \$5 for each trip. We believe from experience sea-sickness does make a man feel mean, and we sympathize with Mr. Elmore that he may not recovered from his heave-up yet.
Mr. Robert Crawford, of Nehalem, was in the city on Sunday, having returned from Astoria, where he had gone to trade some of his products. He says there is a good demand, at top prices, for good dairy produce—and Tillamookers know how to produce that. He took to Astoria 23 kegs of butter, which he says was in fine condition, 12 beefcattle and 12 stock yearlings. He soon found a cash purchaser in Astoria. Mr. Crawford's butter bringing 22 cents, delivered, and his cattle, which averaged 1000 pounds gross, sold for 3½ cents a pound on foot. For his stock yearlings Mr. Crawford received \$16 a head. He left for his home at Nehalem on Monday.
If the cut rate on the steamers between Astoria and Portland of 25c. is not low enough, the O. R. & N. should throw in a couple of meals to make the trips a little more sociable. Now how can we manage to get the transportation companies running into this city on the war path so that Tillamookers can enjoy, at least once in a while, cut rate travel. Gee wiz, there's nothing small about Tillamook when it takes four V's for a few day's outing, on a most economical scale, to Portland. The business men of Astoria must realize what a two-bit fare means to that city, and the editor is not scrapping for equal rights on that score for the purpose of making Tillamook a two-bit city so that people can do their trading in Portland.
Because Portland is capturing Astoria trade, the Astoria Herald says: "Astoria needs sixty first-class funerals." That newspaper fails to mention whether it wants to bury the Astorians who had enough railroad ties in their heads to extend from that city to Portland. If their heads have not assumed their normal shape, we would like to ask Bro. Curtiss if there is enough land in Astoria to bury sixty such people. Tillamookers predicted what building a railroad from Astoria to Portland would entail, when if Astorians had turned their attention to Tillamook they would now be enjoying the advantages of a splendid feeder to their city. The building of the Astoria railroad, if some of the newspapers there is a criterion to go by, practically turns Astorians into Kilkenny cat fighters.

There appears to be a desire on the part of the postal authorities to bring all the mail in again by the North Yamhill route, to reach this city at four o'clock in the afternoon, while the mail from this city is to leave at five o'clock in the evening so as to reach North Yamhill the next day in time to catch the train to Portland. Under this arrangement there would not be enough time for the business men to answer their correspondence, for there is no dependence in the winter months of the mail reaching here on time. As there are two mails daily from Portland, and the one on the morning train can reach this city several hours sooner by coming in by way of Dolph, we do see that any improvement will be made by the suggested change, unless the stage left North Yamhill after the arrival of the morning mail and could reach this city by noon the next day, but even this is objected to on account of traveling over the mountains in the dark. Under the circumstances would it not be better for the present schedule to remain, with the exception of sending the paper mail by way of Dolph and for the government to pay the mail carriers extra who pack it?
