Owing to the occasional outbreak of scarlet fever in Tillamook city, it is time that all germs of the disease were stamped out, for it is now fifteen months since it made its first appearance. On the face of it shows that proper precautions have not been taken to kill the germs in the houses where children have been affected with it by thoroughly disinfecting and fumigating the clothing, homes, etc.

deaths have occurred thus far, although the doctors have had several bad cases to contend with. So as to thoroughly stamp the disease out now that it is only cropping out occasionally, let proper sanitary precautions be strictly adhered to in the future and the germs will soon be obliterated, although it may take a little more time to do so owing to some houses having the germs of the disease still in them.

The city council on Monday again laid over the recommendation of Mayor D. Wiley, appointing Mr. T. H. Goynne city attorney, whereas the council confirmed the appointments of city surveyor and street commissioner. We repeat what said on a previous occasion, that the city council should have confirmed Mayor Wiley's appointment, for it is a matter which does not require dilatory action.

How thankful Tillamookers ought to be with the nice mild winter they have been enjoying compared with that described by a person who writes us for information about this county: "We don't like the climate in Western New York. Last night at dark it was 40 deg. above zero, and within 15 minutes it blew a terrible blizzard, and this morning at daylight it was 10 degs. above zero and the snow blowing at the rate of sixty miles an hour."

The scalp-bounty law appears to be meeting with opposition in some counties. In a letter to County Judge Terrell, of Salem, Judge Barton, of Linn county, refers to the neglect of other counties to comply with the law. Linn county made its levy in January, as required. As Multnomah has refused to make the levy, Linn is not at all anxious to pay, and there is some talk of testing the validity of the law.

We notice that valley wheat is quoted at 50c a bushel in Portland and creamery butter from 50c. to 55c. a roll, with a prospect for an advance in consequence of the receipts not being large enough to supply the demand. We don't think there's any dairymen in this county who would want to swap their dairy farms for wheat ranches. Nit, when it comes to figuring on making dollars and cents. Our South Prairie correspondent reported last week that the September returns from the cheese factory there gave the dairymen 28 1/2 cents per pound for their butter fat, so it's no good trying to argue that wheat at the figures quoted above can come anywhere near being as profitable in raising compared with dairying in Tillamook county.

Tillamook had just one half the amount of rainfall last month as it had in January of 1899, or a deficit of 12 inches to start in with for the first month in the new century. If Weather Prophet Dawson can keep this luck up during the year, we don't think Tillamookers will be prone to do much kicking. He should, however, reserve some of the fine weather he has been giving us for the spring, when a lot of people will be in here looking for locations.
