

It deals with the pernicious system of running the public into debt as well as into the hands of the money sharks. The amendment abrogates the present section of the state constitution which provides that no county shall incur an indebtedness exceeding in the aggregate sum of \$5,000, and in its stead proposes to substitute a section that shall extend the limitation of indebtedness to cities, school districts and other municipal corporations, as well as counties, so that their aggregate indebtedness shall not exceed 5 per cent of the taxable property therein.
