

DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

The "Unterrified" Nominated a County Ticket

The democratic county convention was held in this city on Saturday, which was called to order by Mr. P. W. Todd, chairman of the county committee, who was made temporary chairman, and Mr. Frank Fitzpatrick temporary secretary. Chairman Todd stated the reason why Mr. Conder was nominated, and although Mr. Conder reiterated

what he had previously said, it remains to be seen whether he will reconsider the matter and accept the nomination. We understand Mr. Conder has reconsidered the matter and his friends have induced him to accept the nomination.

"What are you doing, cook?" asked 4-year-old Harry.

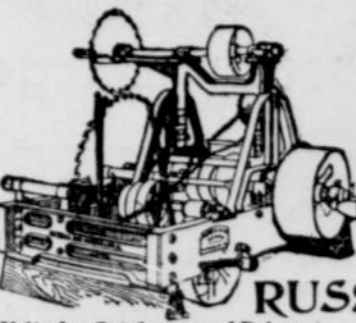
"Cleaning some fish for your dinner," was the reply.

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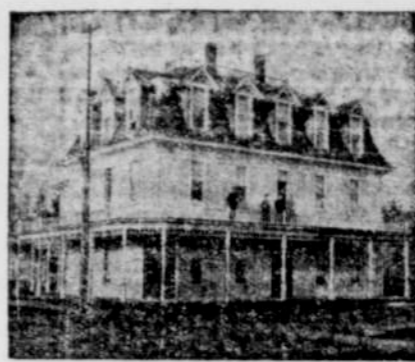
