Local Expansion and Industrial Development the issue for Tillamook.

What is the issue in the next election which is paramount to every citizen of Tillamook, no matter whether he is a republican, democrat, populist or prohibitionist? It is this, Local expansion and industrial development. This is within reach by voting the republican ticket, a long way off by voting the democratic ticket, and one of antediluvian date by casting a vote for the prohibitionists. Yet we see citizens, business men in the democratic and prohibition parties who have done no end of kicking about bad and exorbitant transportation service. Local interests this year overshadow all others so far as Tillamook is concerned, for, as we have so often pointed out, a government appropriation for the improvement of Tillamook harbors and bars will be included in the next river and harbor bill, provided, however, that the influences which have been brought to bear during the past twelve months to secure an appropriation of \$250,000 can be kept in line. If it was depending upon people who whittle wood on the street corners and chew the rag but little progress would have been made to this end. But, thanks to a number of our enterprising citizens, who have been quietly for some months getting all the push they possibly could behind the proposed project to improve Tillamook bars, have the matter so far arranged to lay the circumstances before the river and harbor committee. What is essential now is that this committee should be induced to recommend the above appropriation, and with Congressman Tongue as a member of that committee, conditions were never more favorable than they are today for Tillamook getting out of her bottled up, industrially incapacitated condition. This is the reason the Headlight believes the question of paramount importance so far as this county is concerned is local expansion and industrial development. We all realize that this will follow as soon as these improvements are made. Let us delve a little deeper into this matter and ask a few pertinent questions. What has the prohibition party of this county done or could do if elected to bring about relief? The answer to that query is, They could do nothing. To vote the democratic ticket and defeat Congressman Tongue, would it not be throwing cold water upon those who have interested themselves in Tillamook's behalf, and doing the same thing to the dairying, lumbering, logging and other productive and manufacturing industries of this county? Tillamook county wants Congressman Tongue in congress and on the river and harbor committee for several years yet, and when it comes to the day of election we believe that most every voter, regardless of his political prejudices or prohibition principles, will vote for Congressman Tongue, which is synonymous with Tillamook's industrial growth and prosperity. Vote the republican ticket straight and prove yourself a loyal Tillamooker.

They Stand for a Continuance of Republican Prosperity.

The next matter of importance is the election of joint senator and joint representative, for the simple reason that they will vote for a United States senator at the next session of the state legislature. This brings to the front matters of national importance and the platform upon which republicans stand. There is not one particle of doubt but what Tillamook will still pile up a good majority for the republicans next June, in fact, the prosperity all over the United States and Tillamook county have induced a number of voters to return to the republican party, having got tired of populism. Strange, the republican platform of Oregon fails to mention one important matter. When the republican party came into power, after four years of democratic government, it found the country paralyzed as to its industry, weak in trade and commerce and impoverished in its public treasury. Business conditions were utterly unsettled, no less by the operation of a mischievous tariff than by the assaults of the democratic party upon the public credit in their reckless financial bills and their threats to redeem in silver certain public securities. This is an absolutely true statement of the conditions prevailing when the republicans came into power, and how did the democratic party propose to remedy them? By the free and unlimited coinage of silver at 16 to 1. The republicans, on the other hand, proposed a policy that would open the mills and give employment to labor, together with the maintenance of a sound currency. The people accepted the republican policy, and results have splendidly vindicated their judgment. The advent of a republican administration brought with it a revival of industries, an increase of commerce and a demand for labor. It gave confidence to capital and invigorated enterprise. Every assurance the republican party gave the people in the last national campaign has been realized, so far as relates to the material conditions of the country. In the three years during which the party has been in power the industrial and commercial growth of the United States has been unprecedented, while the credit of the nation has been strengthened and its financial

condition immeasurably improved. Millions of people who in the period of depression under democratic government were unable to earn enough to obtain the necessities of life have since had well paid employment. Capital that was idle then is now safely and profitably invested. Every portion of the land is having a higher degree of prosperity than it has ever before known. These are facts and conditions which should command the thoughtful attention of ever voter in Tillamook county. They distinguish the present administration from all its predecessors and they make a powerful appeal to national pride and patriotism. The question naturally arises, are we going to continue in this state of prosperity or revert to calamity howling times of a few years ago and all the attending hard times under a democratic administration? Your votes next June will answer the question. Tillamookers have participated in the general prosperity of the country, as can be demonstrated by the price of butter fat and all kinds of stock in this county, so along that line it is useless to dwell, for only an ignoramus would contend otherwise. The republicans have nominated Congressman Tongue to represent this district in congress; Dr. W. Tyler Smith for joint senator for Yamhill, Tillamook and Lincoln counties, and Mr. B. L. Eddy for joint representative for Yamhill and Tillamook counties, upon the legislative ticket, and they stand for a continuance of republican prosperity, industrial activity and contentment.

Republicans, Vote Straight! Decrease of County's Debt.

In regard to county affairs it is imperative that the taxpayers' interest should be well looked after, and it is incumbent that a conservative and economic expenditure of tax money take place. This is what every taxpayer in the county demands. The Headlight and the republicans of Tillamook are diametrically opposed to any increase in the county's indebtedness, and from now on a steady decrease in it should be made. This is right and proper, for the officials who run the county into debt and burden the taxpayers with interest bearing warrants must expect to be severely criticised. Of course, we are aware that most of the officials have very little to do with the expenditure of tax money, that falling upon the board of county commissioners. As Mr. L. Parrish, the republican nominee for county commissioner, has given his assurance that he will endeavor to decrease the county's debt and thereby put a stop to interest bearing warrants and the loss entailed in discontinuing them, we believe that Mr. Parrish will stick to that policy, which will not only reflect credit upon himself but upon the county and the republican party as well. The office of county commissioner is an important one, and the person who fills it must have a will of his own, have good business judgment and a practical knowledge of road making and bridge work. We think Mr. Parrish possess these qualifications and comes up to the Headlight's standard, so we have much pleasure in recommending him to the citizens of this county to look after the taxpayers' interests for the next four years. As all the other nominees on the republican county ticket have been renominated by a convention made up of representative republicans from all parts of the county, they need but little recommendation at our hands. We can say this for Clerk Mason, Sheriff Alderman, Treasurer Cary, School Supt. Lamb, Assessor Stephens, Surveyor Austin and Coroner Tuttle that they have attended strictly to the duties of their respective offices, and it would be hard to find a county in Oregon where officials have given such general satisfaction as these have in this county, for they have the respect and confidence of the taxpayers, and no matter what their political affiliations are they recognize that the "boys" have done the right thing and no fault can be found with them. The Headlight recommended that they be renominated, and they were renominated. We now recommend them to the voters for re-election, feeling assured that the taxpayers will take the Headlight's advice by voting a straight republican ticket and return them to office with an overwhelming majority.

"Hot" for Prohibitionists.

Rev. F. H. Neff said he was going to make it hot for those who did not vote the prohibition ticket. Steady, brother, now wouldn't it be more reasonable to make it hot for the prohibitionists who remain dormant, year in and year out, with the exception of a few weeks previous to an election, when they gather together the clans and shout off their ram's horns, accusing the old parties of being in league with the drink element and all that is damnable in the country, even calling into question a church member's Christianity and consistency if he fails to vote according to the ideas of a few prohibition dictators? We have no fight with the prohibition party, but we have with those who get extremely hot-headed and illogical just before an election over prohibition, while at other times they are down to zero. No wonder their cause is stagnant in this state, and the only way to size up the prohibition question, taking the elections in Oregon since 1884 for a criterion, is that a few cranks succeed every election in inducing a few hundred citizens to throw away

their votes. * * * The framers of the republican platform made a mistake when they inserted in the state platform a plank for increasing the number of supreme judges from three to five, for this is not a party issue. That's one of the planks we don't stand on, and if the taxpayers want to unnecessarily increase taxation they can do so by voting for the amendment to the constitution next June. The fact is, most attorneys are allowed too much leeway in prolonging cases and having them reargued, retried and taken from one court to another, to say nothing of the waste of time in arguing some technical point which often amounts to practically nothing. Choke off some of these attorneys who persistently take cases from one court to another because their clients have money to foot the bill, and the three supreme judges won't have a press of business. * * * We are glad to be informed that the republicans of this county will go into the present campaign united and with a solid front, hence the democrats will be badly fooled if they figure upon receiving any republican votes to help them out. Republicans who were not exactly satisfied with the action of the county convention now see that it is wise on their part to fall into line and work for every nominee on the ticket. This is good politics, and we are glad to know that this is so. Furthermore, no matter who is running on the other tickets, republicans must vote a straight ticket, not deviate one iota for either personal friendship or for any other cause. The Headlight's advice is, "Vote her straight, boys!" And then see the republicans come down on the democrats and prohibitionists with both feet. * * * Suppose that the woman suffrage amendment should pass, who will control the votes of the prostitutes in our large cities? This is a dangerous element to bring into our body politic, especially when the vote is close. Fancy a candidate for office, with strong social purity ideas, having to toady to this element for votes, while on the other hand we do not think that it would shock the modesty of the average ward politician to induce these unfortunate women to vote according to his dictation, especially if he had hoodie, as he surely would, to back him. * * * It's a conundrum why the prohibitionists in this county nominated only part of a county ticket. Perhaps, however, it would be straining their consciences to vote for clerk, sheriff, assessor, school superintendent, treasurer and coroner on the republican ticket, but when it comes to voting for road supervisors our prohibition friends will swallow a road supervisor belonging to old parties without making a wry face. * * * It is only tantalizing dairymen to be told that, owing to shallow bars, their butter cannot be shipped, and when it does reach market deteriorated in value they have to stand the loss. Dairymen who have got tired of doing business that unprofitable way should vote for Congressman Tongue and the republican ticket. * * * What is exceedingly surprising in this county is the dirth of political cranks who rattle-dazzle populists before an election. Even the democrats can't hoodoo them. Well, as a number broke away from the republican party, they are cordially invited back, for republicans don't like to see them out in the cold with no one to pity them. * * * If any republicans think of flopping over to the prohibitionists we would advise them to scratch their craniums and ask themselves where they will be at when they get tired of throwing away votes. * * * A person who goes into a republican or democratic primary should stay with the party and not flop over to any other party because they did not get recognized nor receive a nomination. * * * "Pity the sorrows of a poor old man!" Well, our populist friends can be made one of the boys again and find relief by coming back to the republican fold. * * * Who wants to hobnob with prohibitionists and calamity howlers? * * * Motto for republicans: "Vote her straight, boys!"
