#### Training for the Public Service.

Two of the nation's brainiest men cross swords in the May issue of Success, over the question, "Should Young Men be Trained for Public Life?"

Senator Foraker takes the negative side of the question. Says he, in his trenchant, stiletto-like phrasing: "You cannot make a silk purse out of a sow's ear. No amount of education, or professional training, will make a man successful as a diplomat, as a statesman, or even as a politician, unless he has the groundwork of common sense, integrity of character, and a reasonable aptitude for public affairs. If he has these qualities he can succeed in any avocation, other things being equal; and he is likely to drift, or be called, sooner or later, into the public service, especially if circumstances should occur to make a demand for him."

"Special professional training may be necessary to make a diplomat in the European sense, but not in the American sense."

Congressman Littlefield of Maine says: "All hail to any improvement in administrations! The better the men in control, the fitter the public servants, the sooner we shall reach a perfect government. The special training of young men for the diplomatic service would be a step in this general reform. It might in time be extended to the public service in other branches, and even reflect an improvement in the personnel of congress, but, for the present, it should be considered with especial reference to our foreign relations."

"The educative effort should be made by the colleges and universities and encouraged and sustained by the nation. In our great and growing department of state we have heretofore had merely intelligent men of address to depend upon. I quite indorse the suggestion that we should have men not only intelligent, but also adroit, skilled and clever as well. Let the colleges and universities enlarge their courses in civil government and political economy and bring them up to date. They should teach more living languages and fewer dead ones. It should be firmly grafted upon the policy of both political parties, by declaration and by practice, that efficient men will be kept in positions requiring expert knowledge and diplomatic training regardless of party changes. Of course, it would be inconceivable that this course ever become applicable to all offices; as, for instance, Mr. Bryan, if elected president, could not be expected to retain either Mr. Hay or Mr. Gage at the head of his respective department. But there are official subordinates everywhere who really do the most of the work and are of the highest usefulness in the public service, who need not be disturbed. Civil service reform alone will not meet the needs of our national growth. There must be something more and I think I have pointed out what it is."

#### ANGORA GOAT BREEDERS'

Something of the Breed and the Breeders' Association and What They Propose to do.

There has been some little said about Angora goats through the press of late, although the industry is by no means a new one. It may not be generally known that Angora goats are the basis of one of the greatest industries in the world, particularly in parts of foreign countries. They produce more wealth and furnish more sustenance for the people of Turkey, Persia and South Africa than any other industry in those countries. The governments of those countries think so much of Angora goats, and knowing they have a good thing, have placed legal embargoes on the exportation of these valuable animals from their domains. In those countries Angoras are the property of kings, princes and titled potentates to such a large degree that they absolutely control the output of mohair, of which the most valuable fabrics known to fair ladies throughout Christendom are made.

By dint of the merest luck in 1862 a few of these valuable animals were passed through the borders of Turkey unnoticed by one of the shrewdest of Georgia's enterprising citizens. From this importation to the United States began the Angora industry that we now speak of. Far-seeing and enterprising men secured what they could of this importation, bred, raised and a saved the Angoras in all their purity until at this time there are a goodly number in this country—enough to extend the industry whereby it will become one of the most profitable businesses that our farmers and ranchmen may engage in, especially so when they know more about it. This will be accomplished by this and other information and they will soon become enlightened on something that will prove very remunerative to them. Think of shearing from four to eight and often ten to twelve pounds of mohair to the fleece, worth 35 @ 40c. a pound, with only a limited number of factories in this country. They are fully as prolific as sheep and are not subject to many contagious diseases. They are also able to protect themselves from dogs and wolves.

The meat from Angoras, known as Angora venison, is fully as good as the most juicy mutton. This meat is being sought now more than at any previous time. Angoras live and thrive on less expensive feed than other stock. They prefer to live on hilly and irregular lands, such as are of least value to the farmer. They will go into the thickest of thickets and under brush and clean the land of every bush and shrub, thereby doubling its value, and at the same time not injuring in the least degree any feed suitable for other animals.

With this knowledge of the superiority of Angoras, a few gentlemen, some of the best breeders in the country, have organized the American Angora Goat Breeders' association at Kansas City for the purpose of perpetuating and maintaining that breed, unimpaired in its purity, for the benefit of future generations, the same as has been done for other thorough bred stock. It is the purpose of this association to bring together all breeders of pure bred Angora in this country, whereby they may become better acquainted and their efforts mutually benefited. The association desires the aid and co-operation of all breeders of pure bred Angora goats. It desires to establish a standard of excellence that may be satisfactory to those having at heart the good of the Angora goat breed. It will gladly receive suggestions from practical breeders throughout the country. To further the interests of breeders, the association proposes to hold in Kansas City in the second week of October, this year, a combination Angora goat sale, the first of the kind ever held in this country. All breeders are requested to send to this sale some of their choice specimens. It will create great enthusiasm, resulting in every breeder's being greatly benefited.

The association also has in view the establishing at Kansas City of a central market for mohair, where buyers and sellers can meet, which is known to be the American Mohair exchange. It will also encourage manufacturers of Mohair to erect establishments in Kansas

City, it being the greatest western railroad center. Favorable rates can be secured from all mohair raising districts, and for car or train loads to the east or to any part of the country for the finished product.

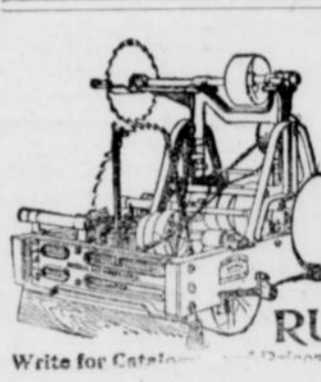
