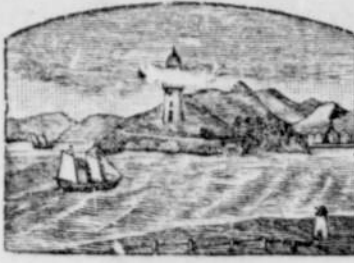

A council meeting was held on Wednesday evening, with President A. J. Cohn in the chair and Councilmen M. Leach, G. A. Edmunds and L. Olsen present. Bills were ordered paid: Recorder, \$10; marshal and street commissioner \$49. The bill of \$40 from the water company for water for the month of May was not paid on account of the contract with the city having expired, the recorder being instructed to ask Mr. Cooper for fresh

contract. Councilman Hiner's seat was declared vacant on account of absence from the city and, consequently not able to attend to the duties. An ordinance was passed licensing merry-go-rounds at \$5 a day and \$25 a week. A surprise was in store for the city dads when Marshal Lahmon handed in his resignation as city marshal, who claims that the council is not backing him up in enforcing the city ordinances, and as the marshal would not consent to serve until the council could find a suitable person to fill the position, the council accepted the resignation.

### The Election.

The election on Monday in this county turned out exactly as was predicted, the republicans polling two votes to one cast by the democrats, which is sufficient evidence to prove that Tillamook is overwhelmingly in favor of President McKinley's expansion policy, the gold standard and republican prosperity. Besides, the vote cast for Congressman Tongue is also an expression of sentiment in favor of local expansion and industrial development, which can be brought about by Mr. Tongue's influence in congress securing an appropriation for the improvement of Tillamook harbors and bars. This alone should be gratifying to Tillamookers who have been bottled up and tied-up with their products for years and with very little prospect of relief, but the time has arrived when the present unsatisfactory state of affairs should be changed, and having confidence in Congressman Tongue's influence in congress to help bring government improvements about, it is a source of satisfaction to know that this county so loyally supported him. In doing so the republicans showed they had the business interests and future development of Tillamook county at heart—two worthy objects deserving the support of every voter in the county. But no thanks is due the few disgruntled republicans who adopted a rule of ruin policy, but their jig did not work, although it is freely asserted that they knifed several nominees on the republican ticket, a fact which will not be forgotten two years hence. In regard to the republican county ticket it was a foregone conclusion that it would be elected, the large vote, however, showing that the taxpayers were well pleased with the county officials and who were entitled to another term of office. The fight was centered on sheriff and county clerk, where a preponderance of democratic strength was expected to materialize, but they had attacked the wrong kolbies, with the result that they were greatly surprised when the ballots were counted. What with having to contend with republican prosperity, expansion and popular candidates on the republican ticket, the democrats had a difficult campaign on their hands. However, they put on a bold front and did the best they could under the circumstances, and now that the election is over it is safe to predict that the newly elected county officials will continue to discharge their duties to the interest of the taxpayers.
