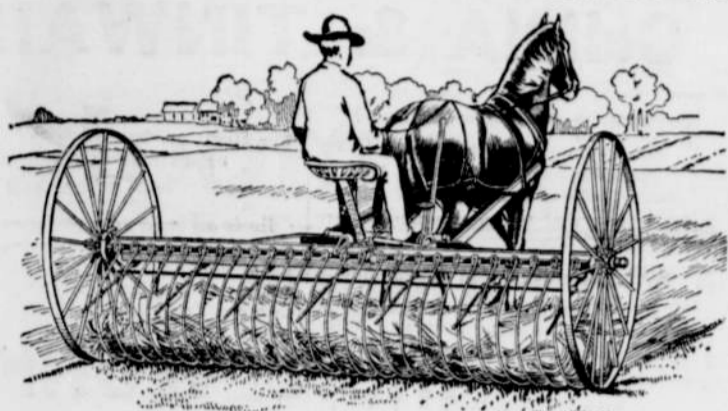

Bro. C. N. Drew has been elected by Star lodge, A.O.U.W., to represent that lodge at the grand lodge meeting, which convenes at Salem next month. Bro. F. N. Wilson was the alternate.

The Astoria Company has bought three more timber claims, paying Mary A. Bolton \$700 for one in tp. 2 N, R 9 W; Howell Lewis \$700 for his claim in tp. 3 N, R 9 W; and Joseph Kezel \$650 for his claim in tp. 3 N, R 8 W.
Mr. Hadley's roadsters bolted from the city on Monday, going through Main street at full speed. Breaking the tongue of the buggy and freeing themselves, they went as far as the Pacific saw mill, the only damage being to the buggy.
Rev. E. W. St. Pierre is expected from Portland in a day or so with a view to becoming pastor of the Presbyterian church, and should he arrive in time he will probably preach at Bay City on Sunday morning and in this city in the evening.
Colonel J. W. Linck, special agent of the customs department, was in the city on Tuesday and left again on Wednesday. He came for the purpose of seeing whether it is necessary to re-establish the office of deputy collector of customs at Tillamook.
A dancing academy will be opened in the Opera House by Prof. F. G. Swanton on Saturday evening, June 16th, and a few of the latest dances introduced. Lessons will be given daily from 3 to 5 and 7:30 to 10:30 P. M. Ladies and children taught at half price. Everybody invited.
The government steamer General H. G. Wright crossed in on Tuesday and came up to the city. She had on board Colonel Mansfield and Captain W. W. Harts, of the engineer's department, who had come to inspect the work in the bay and in Hoquartion slough. The steamer left again the same night.
On next Wednesday, if the weather is favorable, the M.E. Sunday school will give a picnic in some grove near the city to be selected by a committee, to which all the members of the school and the parents of the children are cordially invited. All lunches brought should be left at the parsonage not later than 9 o'clock a.m. to be hauled to the grounds.
What with the proposed extension of the railroad from Sheridan and that of the Seaside railroad to Tillamook, a third proposal is now talked of, that of the California & Northwestern Railroad building from Ukiah, Cal., along the coast to Astoria, of course coming through Tillamook. Can't another railroad proposition be made, for Tillamookers have been chewing at the railroad cud so long they won't believe there's anything to all this gossip until they see the iron horse puffing and snorting.
We are sorry to hear that Father J. J. Burri is not likely to remain in charge of the Catholic church in this city, as the Bishop of Idaho is wanting him back in his diocese. The rev. gentlemen's health has improved since he has been here, and the doctors think that he cannot stand the climate of that state. Unless other arrangements are made Father Burri will leave some time this month, and although his stay in Tillamook has been short, it is a well recognized fact that he has been instrumental in doing much good.
Word was brought to this city Monday that the house and contents on the Mowers place at Happy Bend was destroyed by fire on Sunday afternoon. It appears that Mr. W. D. Gladwill and his family were about to start for Blaine, when it was seen that the roof was on fire. Mr. Gladwill thought he could put the fire out and water was procured for that purpose, but after working ener-

getically for some time in trying to extinguish the fire, he had to give up, for it had gained on him inside the house. Mr. Gladwill then turned his attention to saving some of the contents of the house, but it was then too late, for all that he succeeded in getting out was a bedstead and trunk. Having recently arrived here from Missouri and purchasing the place from Mr. Geo. A. Mowers, it is a serious loss to Mr. Gladwill to lose, his house, furniture, clothing and supplies. Mr. Mowers had the house insured in the Oregon Fire Relief Association, and the loss is about a \$1000.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Some of the Mismatched Couples are Made Happy.
Judge R. P. Boise has been holding court in this city the whole of the week, and up to the time of going to press he had disposed of the following cases:
W. M. Ladd, C. E. Ladd, John Wesley Ladd, plaintiff, vs. William E. Jacobine Olsen, defendants. Suit to set aside deeds. C. Thayer attorney for plaintiff and J. J. Daly for defendant. This case was continued until the next term.
Dell Burdick, plaintiff, vs. Netarts Bay Lumber Co., defendants. A. W. Severance attorney for plaintiff. Suit to foreclose lien, which the court granted in the sum of \$37.70, making, with costs, \$107.60.
First National Bank of Independence, a corporation, plaintiff, vs. William E. Burns and Drucilla Burns defendants. Confirmation of sale. Townsend and Potter attorneys for plaintiff, Daly & Harter for defendants. Confirmation of sale was granted.
A. W. Bill, plaintiff, vs. H. A. Woodford and W. G. Kelso, defendants. Foreclosure. Stott, Boise and Stott attorneys for plaintiff. B. L. Eddy attorney for defendant. This case was to recover the sum of \$691.67 and accruing interest and \$100 attorney's fees from the defendant Woodford, the court granting a foreclosure of the mortgage.
T. T. Geer (Board of School Fund Commissioners), plaintiff, vs. A. L. Alderman, Phoebe J. Alderman, James Hughey, administrator of the estate of B. Higgenbotham, defendants. Suit for foreclosure. Claude Thayer attorney for plaintiff. Court granted a foreclosure, it being shown that the defendants owed the sum of \$753.33, added to which was \$50 attorney's fees and the costs.
T. T. Geer (Board of School Fund Commissioners) vs. A. L. and Phoebe Alderman, James Hughey, administrator of the estate of B. Higgenbotham, deceased, Ella Higgenbotham and Ed. Morin. This case went by default and a foreclosure was granted, the defendants being sued for \$725.38 and costs.
T. T. Geer (board of school fund commissioners), plaintiff, vs. C. H. Worthington, defendant. Foreclosure. Claude Thayer attorney for plaintiff. Went by default and foreclosure ordered, the suit being for \$914.60 and the usual costs.
T. T. Geer (Board of School Fund Commission), plaintiff, vs. E. M. Keggs and Eliza Keggs, defendants. Suit for foreclosure. Claude Thayer attorney for plaintiff. Went by default and foreclosure granted, the defendant being sued for \$740.67 and costs.
J. V. Hunsinger, plaintiff in error, vs. L. Shortridge and A. Shortridge, defendants in error. Writ of review. H. B. Hendricks and W. J. May, attorneys for plaintiff; W. H. Cooper for defendant. The court reversed the judgment in this case.
C. R. Hine, plaintiff, vs. John W. Farquhar, defendant. Suit for foreclosure. A. W. Severance attorney for plaintiff. It was shown that this suit was for the sum of \$1800, which was due the plaintiff, with interest amounting to \$533, attorney's fees \$200, and \$122.49 for taxes, making \$2,695.45, and the court granted the foreclosure.
Alice Kiger, plaintiff, vs. John J. Pye and Elizabeth Pye, defendants. Foreclosure. A. W. Severance, attorney for plaintiff. Case went by default and a foreclosure granted, the sum of \$120.15 being the amount involved, which included interest and costs.
C. & E. Thayer, plaintiff, vs. the Nehalem Mill Co. and Frank Patton, defendants. Confirmation of sale.
In the matter of the guardianship of Maggie Fay Wilson, et al, minors and Kate R. Wilson, plaintiff, vs. Fred Scheringer, J. W. Hellenbrand, et al, petitioners and parties herein on their joint petition for the allowance of certain credits in the account of C. G. Cutting, former guardian of said minors. R. C.

Wright attorney for plaintiff, and B. L. Eddy and T. H. Goyme for defendants. Case was continued.
T. J. Lucy, plaintiff, vs. C. G. Cutting, J. J. Daly, as attorney for said C. G. Cutting, J. W. Hellenbrand, Fred Scheringer, A. Arstilt, the Dallas City Bank, vs. M. E. Ellis and R. E. Williams, defendants. In junction. T. H. Goyme and B. L. Eddy attorneys for plaintiff. Court adjudged that each of the defendants are in default and overruled the demurrer of J. W. Hellenbrand, and it was decreed that the preliminary injunction heretofore granted in this cause be made perpetual, and that the defendants are enjoined from paying out or collecting monies belonging to the estate.
George W. Phelps, plaintiff, vs. Mary J. Phelps, defendants. Suit for divorce. B. L. Eddy attorney for plaintiff. A divorce was granted in this case, the evidence going to show that the defendant wilfully and without cause deserted and abandoned the plaintiff, who was given the custody of the children.
Newton Robinson, plaintiff, vs. Mary B. Robinson, defendant. Suit for divorce. Handley & Handley attorneys for plaintiff. This case was not contested and the judge granted a divorce on the evidence of plaintiff, which went to show that defendant is living in British Columbia with a man by the name of Smeer. Plaintiff was given charge of two children who were within the jurisdiction of the court.
George N. Johnson, plaintiff, vs. Netarts Bay Lumber Co., defendant. Upon stipulation it was ordered that the clerk transfer this cause from department No. 1 to the docket of No. 2 for trial before this court. Upon trial judgment was given for defendant for costs.
